

National Defense Test Day Will Be Observed

Governor Pierce and Lieut. Col. John R. Kelly, assistant chief of staff of the United States army for the ninth corps area, will meet at Camp Lewis Monday to discuss Oregon's part in National Defense Test day, which is September 12 next.

Colonel Kelly, representing Maj. Gen. Charles C. Morton, commander of the ninth corps area, asks Governor Pierce to appoint a commission of Oregon citizens to work up Oregon's program for the test day. A mobilization test will be the feature of the day, but details of arrangements in each state, city and town will be left to the local committees of citizens who will be appointed by civil officials.

For the first time during peace time all units of the three components of the United States army, the regular army, the national guard and the organized reserves,

will be mobilized at their home stations.

While at Camp Lewis, Colonel Kelly will inspect the Oregon troops now in annual encampment there.

Secretary of State Koser and State Treasurer Myers will also go to Camp Lewis.

3 WORLD'S RECORD BREAKERS FINISH CLOSE TOGETHER IN IOWA TRYOUTS FOR OLYMPIC GAMES



Eric Wilson broke Charlie Faddock's world's record for 200 meters when he met Charles Brookins and Chap Coulter at Iowa City. He did the distance in 21 1-10 seconds and then went on and set a new world's record for the 400 meters, doing it in 48 1-10 seconds. Brookins holds four world's low-hurdle records and his done the 220 yard in 23 flat on three occasions. Coulter broke the world's 400 meter record around two turns in 52 2-10 seconds in the same race.

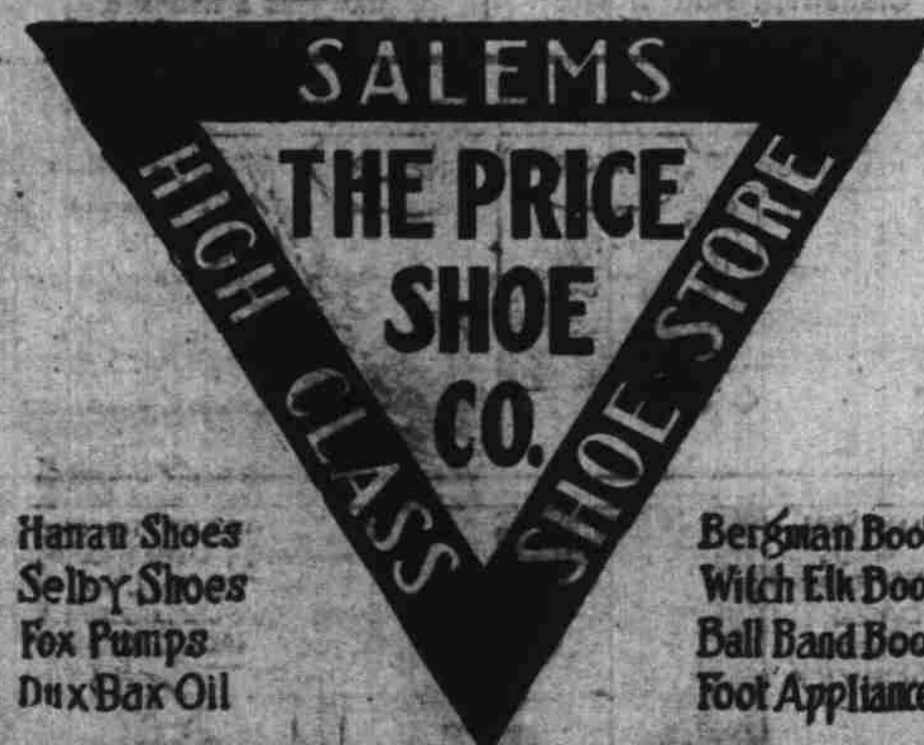
