LEGION TEAM WINS
TWILIGHT TROPHY

For the third consecutive year the American legion baseball team is again champion of the Twilight League by defeating the Spaulding Loggers 3 to 1 in the final game played at Oxford park last night.

Parker, Acton, and Gabrielson brought in one run apiece in the fourth inning, giving a safe lead. Pennington failed to touch third base in making a dash for home and lost another run. "Red" Hagedorn was greatly responsible for the legion victory, for though he pitched at times, he settled down in the pinch and was always on hand when needed.

Hooper, Loggers' twirler, pitched a good game but his support along the left side of the field was poor, and Rickman, standard catcher, was not up to standard and failed on a number of plays when he was badly needed.

The Loggers were also a little weak with the stick. In the sixth inning they failed and Price brought in one run, leaving the bases filled with only one out. Hagedorn tightened and fanned Rickman and Batistone, either of whom was in a position to bring in a man by a short hit.

By winning the championship of the league, the legion becomes the permanent owner of the beautiful silver loving cup offered by Hauser Brothers, and each player receives a gold watch fob, given by P. D. Quisenberry, president of the league last year. The games have been close this year and until the last few games the championship could have been won by either the winner, YMCA or the Loggers.

Few Firms Will Withdraw
From Compensation Law

Caused largely by a campaign against the state workmen's compensation law, a larger number of large Oregon concerns than in previous years notified the industrial accident commission during May that they would withdraw from operation under the compensation act. At least 90 per cent of them, however, have changed their minds after investigating, according to Dillard Elkins, chairman of the commission, and this month have notified the commission that they will remain under the provisions of the act.

The law provides that firms wishing to withdraw from operation under the act must notify the commission of this during the month of May. If they later wish to withdraw their rejection they must notify the commission before July 1.

Manager Biddy Bishop of the Salem Senators has been feeling rather regretful this week because of what he terms the "bloomer" exhibition afforded the Salem fans at Oxford field last Sunday when Vancouver sent a team of juveniles to play the Senators. To offset that affair Bishop promises that the next four games here will be with first class teams that should be capable of making the Senators play at the peak of their ability if they are to win.

Next Sunday the Kalama, Wash. team will be here. This team has not been defeated this season and has a record of nine straight wins to its credit. It is said the Kalama manager will be loaded for bear Sunday, since he does not want to spoil his season's reputation. "King" Cole, who has lost only one game this year, and that when he appeared for Longview against Salem, will be on the hill for Kalama. Cole is considered one of the best pitchers in the state, and is eager to get even in Salem for the way the fans "rode" him in that fatal eighth inning when he was here recently.

On July 4 Bishop's team will play Montavilla. Up to last Sunday this team was tied with the Nikolai team for leading place in the Portland City league, and in Sunday's game Nikolai won by a 2 to 1 score in a pitchers' battle.

On July 6 in Salem the Senators will meet the West Coast team, which is leading the Interstate league, and on July 13, if negotiations work out, the Cyclops club, leader of the Sunrise league of Portland, will play here.

After July 13 the Senators will be on two-weeks' trip into Washington, meeting all the best semi-professional clubs of that state.

ed that the agreements tended to stop all parties to the plan from contesting the validity of the patent exhibits and to burden interstate trade with heavy charges in the guise of royalties.

These royalties, it is contended, range from half a cent to a cent and a quarter a gallon on gasoline produced by the cracking process for domestic consumption. It is also charged that the companies have sought to restrain trade by prohibiting large movements of gasoline supplies and other unpated commodities and to give the Standard Oil company of Indiana a virtual monopoly of trade and commerce in the 15 states known as Indiana company territory.

The petition asks that the companies be restrained "from further carrying out or maintaining such conspiracies, combination attempts to monopolize and monopolizations" that the system of contracts which violate sections of the antitrust law be declared null and void and that the defendants be enjoined from entering into like contracts in the future.

What hope have we from a system in which Wall Street gets our limbs and Congress gets our goats?

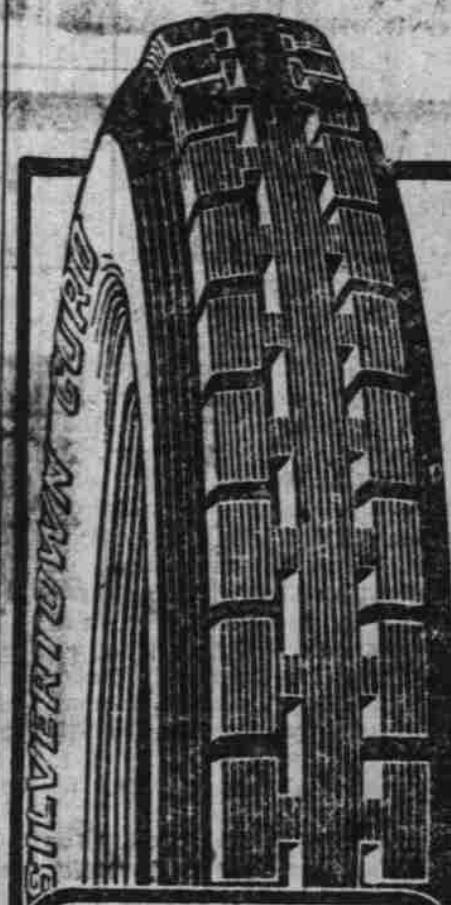

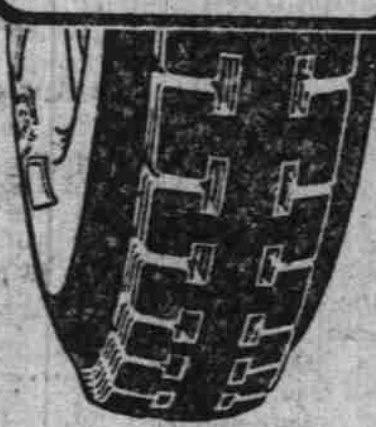
