Miss Corner, leaving Salem late in September, will attend the Columbia River branch meeting of the Woman's Foreign Missionary society at Bellingham, visit with friends and relatives in Seattle, Spokane, Iowa and Boston, arriving in Orange, N. J., for the general executive meeting. She will sail for Bombay the first week in November.

Her work, which will be along evangelistic and educational lines, will follow a year's language study. Her first furlough will come after five years.
