Cast Faces Death in Making Picture

Refreshing in the implied breath of winter which it carries to the spectators swarming in from the sweltering streets "The Cheechahcos," epic film of the Alaskan north, opening its four day engagement at the Grand theater last evening.

Spectators gasped audibly as the great masses of ice, weighing thousands of tons each, broke away from glaciers that stretched as far as the eye could see and plunged into the sea, carrying death and destruction with them.

Chief acting honors go to Eva Gordon, the former international dramatic star of the Danish Players of Copenhagen; Alexis B. Luce, the most villainous villain we have shuddered at in many a day; petite Gladys Johnson, the ingenue and former musical comedy star, and Baby Margie, a kiddie that nearly steals the honors away from the entire cast.

The story of the play deals with history of Alaska during the stirring days of the Klondike gold rush, from 1897 to 1912, and specifically with the adventures of two prospectors, a college professor and his family, and a knife-throwing gambler.

Among the interesting spots shown in the picture are Mt. McKinley, highest peak on the American continent, and photographed for the first time in motion pictures; Child's Glacier, a mass of ice said to be 500 square miles in size, hard as a diamond, and clear as crystal.

It is a picture that will appeal to men because of its thrillingness and great stretches of the outdoors, to women because of the tender love story and touch of mother love that runs through it like a silken strand and to the youngsters because of its scenic values and action.
