OREGON THEATRE TO OFFER NEW SCREEN SENSATION

Starting tomorrow at the Oregon theatre for a run of five days comes the long sought Third Dimension movies. There was a time you remember, when interest, born of curiosity, was awakened and maintained by a few "shots of a man walking across the street or by the scenes of an on rushing train. They were without plot. They were not telling stories in those days. They were just showing things.

The Third Dimension is a picture shown in New York recently. It was never taken on the road because every seat had to be fitted with a special attachment for the eyes of two patrons. The film had the third dimension however. It is a short reel called plastigrams, a series of widely different scenes and subjects and glues the eye to it for the same reason as one watched the early movie through curiosity.

Plastigrams is not the solution for the third dimension picture because one must view it through special lenses which the Oregon theatre ushers will give every patron. The lens consist of a card board framed spectacles and are of two different colors, red and green. The red lens goes over the right eye, and the green over the left.

A bit of trick work introduces the Third Dimension. Double exposures on different scenes and properly tinted, cause the screen to appear as a mixture of red and green colorings. If you put on the special glasses and close one eye you will see fish swimming in an aquarium. If you look on the screen with the other eye, then you see a monkey calmly viewing the world.

College professors, newspaper and magazine editors are unanimous in their praise of Plastigrams, and all agree that it marks a new era in the progress of motion pictures.
