SENATORS BEAT CYCOL PLAYERS

Portland Team Herebefore Undeatable Loses to Salem Sunday

It took a ninth-inning rally for the Salem Senators to win from the Cycol team of Portland on Oxford field Sunday afternoon, but they won by a score of 8 to 7. A hit by Coleman, which scored Miller, won the game for Salem.

Although he got off to a bad start and allowed five tallies on two home runs in the first inning, Art Beemles, new twirler of the Senators, showed a lot of stuff, and is on Biddy Bishop's pitching staff for the trip into Washington which starts today. Ashby went into the box in the eighth inning and allowed one scratch hit.

The batting star Sunday was Mike Miller, the Senator shortstop, who in four times up batted 1000 per cent, one of his hits being a homer. In all seven home runs were made Sunday, four by Salem and three by the Cycols. The game was the first to be lost by the Cycol club this season.

With the visitors five to the good Salem failed to score in its half of the first. The visitors failed to tally in the second, while Coleman of Salem poled a homer. There was no further scoring until the fifth. In that inning Cycol scored again, renewing the five-run lead. In Salem's half of the fifth Miller slammed it over the outfield boards, scoring Proctor ahead of him.

In the seventh Proctor got a homer, making the score 7 to 3 for the visitors. But Shackmann poled a homer in Salem's half of the inning, scoring Proctor ahead of him. Palmore went into the box for Cycol and walked a bunch of batters, filling the bases. When he walked Coleman he forced in a run. This made the score 7 to 6 for Cycols.

In the eighth Proctor for Salem slammed out a homer, tying the score. He was rewarded with a shower of coins from grandstand and bleachers.

Cycol failed to score in the ninth. For Salem Miller was walked and Wilkerson was hit by Palmore. A single by Coleman scored Miller and won the game.

VISIT TO MINES OF THE SANTIAM

Salem People Find Work Going on That Looks Very Promising to Them

A number of Salem people visited the Santiam mines on Sunday last and more especially the property of the Lotz-Larsen company. Among the Salemites who looked over this property were Dr. Henry E. Morris, Fred Erixon and E. T. Barnes. They were merely in their capacities as Salemites and individuals.

They found a lot of work going on; and a great deal finished. They found one tunnel 1200 feet deep, another nearly that far into the ore, and in all eight tunnels.

The impression they gained was that, if the values are there which the experts report, there is a bright prospect for Salem, at no distant date, to have a great mining camp within her trading district.

The mining men who have been recently looking at this property on the Little North Fork of the Santiam have, it is said without exception, reported favorably upon the values and the vastness of the ore bodies, and upon the possibilities of making the working of them commercially very profitable.
