PARIS, July 15.—(By The Associated Press.)—Of the 16 survivors in the men's singles in the Olympic tennis tournament there are three Americans—Vincent Richards, Watson M. Washburn and R. Norris Williams. The other members of the American men's quartet, Francis T. Hunter, was put out of the running today by Jean Washer, the Belgian champion, 2-6, 1-6, 6-2, 6-1, 6-4. Miss Helen Wills, the American woman champion, won easily from Mrs. Satterthwaite, of England, 6-1, 6-2. Miss Eleanor Goss, the other American woman contestant, won by default when Miss Contoslavos did not appear to play.

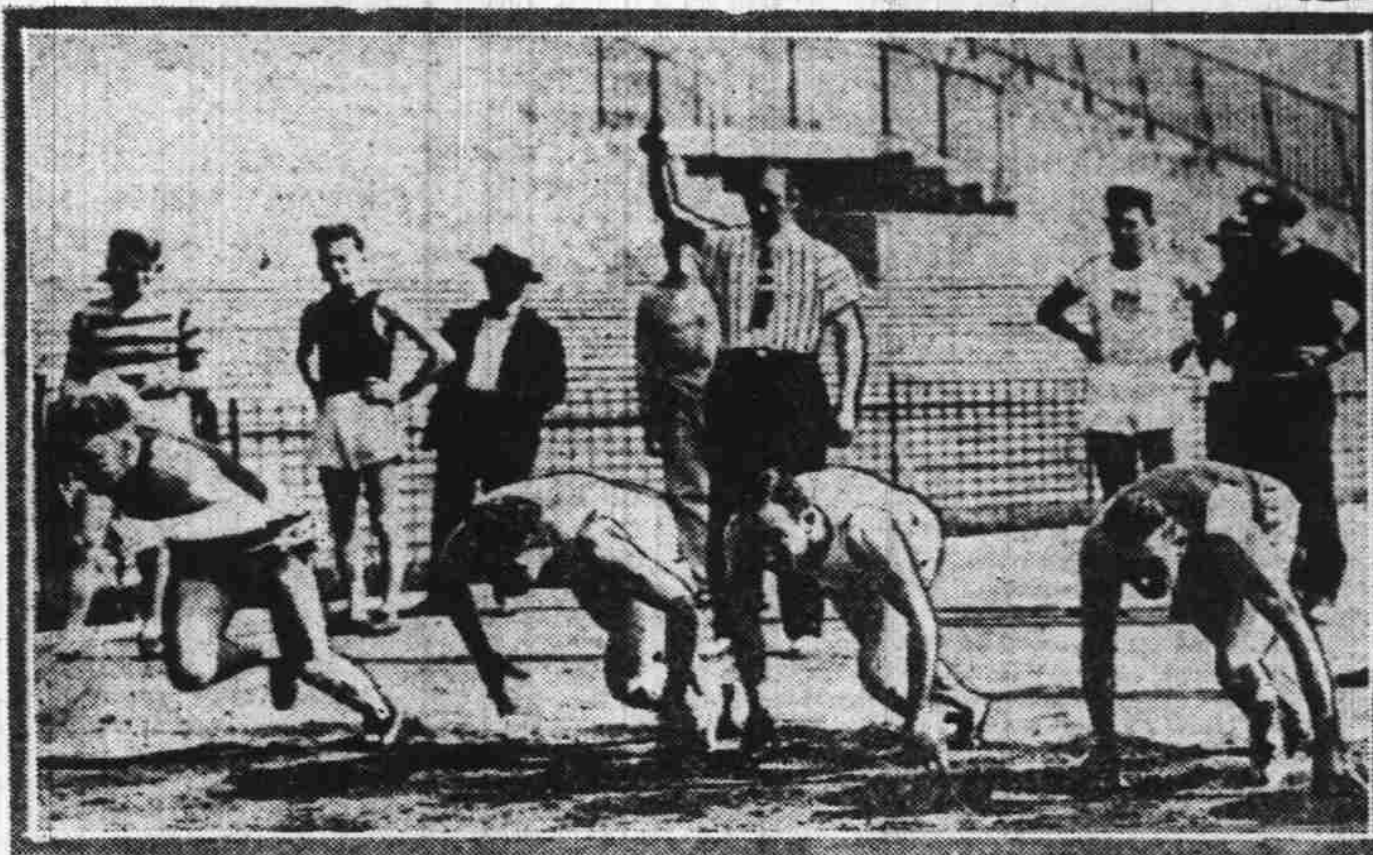

Scholz (at left) and Jackson V. Paddock (at right). They finished only inches apart in the 200 meter event. Scholz won in Olympic record time of 21 3-5 seconds. Paddock was so close to Scholz that a lengthy debate among the officials preceded their announced decision that Scholz was the winner.

Swimming Team Piles Up Points for America
PARIS, July 15.—(By the AP.)—Upon the completion of two days of the Olympic swimming program this evening the United States stood second in the list of 23 nations entered. Australia was first with 24 points while the United States was one point behind.

America's unrivalled women swimmers piled up 19 points in the 400-meter swim, free style, finishing 1, 2, 3, and were mainly responsible for their country's showing, while the men swimmers failed to earn a single point in the 1500 meter event, the plain high divers placing fourth and sixth to add four points to the feminine score.

The United States placed two men out of three in the semi-finals of the 200 meter breast stroke.

Electric Company Resumes Service After Explosion

LOS ANGELES, July 15.—The steam plant of the Southern California Edison company was replaced in operation at Redondo Beach, near here late today after a tank of crude oil exploded and burst into flame, partially wrecking the plant and causing damage estimated at \$3,000.

The barrels of crude oil were ignited by flashes of flame from half a large double switchboard which blew out.

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AMERICANS SECURE IN OLYMPIC LEAD

Famous Yale Crew Goes to Finals; Other Contestants are Qualified

PARIS, July 15.—(By the AP.)—The Americans are strongly entrenched tonight on the various fronts of the Olympic battle after notable victories today in four outstanding branches of competition. The famous Yale crews, the magnet for the greatest crowd that has yet witnessed a rowing competition, easily won in the elimination heat for eight-oared shells over the 3,000 meter course on the Seine river, from the strong Toronto, university eight from Canada. The British crew looms as a formidable opponent.

Jack Kelly and Paul Costello, the Philadelphia stars, qualified with plenty to spare in the double sculls, in which they hold the championship. In the swimming contests the American girls outdid the men and shared the laurels with the Australian swimmers, who led the Americans to the end of the day's three events, 24 points to 23.

Sixteen American boxers in the opening skirmish of the battle for ring honors came off with a big share for the first day, while the American tennis stars continued their victorious march through the field. Miss Helen Wills, American champion, won decisively against Mrs. Satterthwaite of England, though Vincent Richards was compelled to go five sets to conquer the Indian, Slem.

Seattle Attorney Is Debarred for Theft

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 15.—William R. Bell, pioneer Seattle attorney and once superior court judge in King county, has been permanently disbarred from the practice of law in the state by the supreme court, it was learned today. Disbarment was in accordance with recommendations filed by the state board of law examiners in Seattle last September.

The board found that Bell had appropriated to his own use funds amounting to approximately \$1,000, which he obtained for a client as a cash settlement in a divorce action. The finding of the board was upheld by the state court.
