Grievances of Spanish-American War Vets to Be Aired July 24

Investigation of the conduct of the state soldiers' home at Roseburg by Commandant Riddle is to be made by the state board of control Thursday, July 24. Governor Pierce said yesterday. The probe will be largely because of grievances of the Spanish-American war veterans, which have been presented from time to time.

These came to a head a few days ago when Commandant Riddle undertook to oust from the home one John Maurer, a Spanish-American war veteran, because he was not a citizen of Oregon. Maurer was seriously ill with hernia, it was claimed by the veterans. In the absence of the governor and Secretary of State Koser, State Treasurer Jefferson Myers, a member of the board of control, ordered Riddle to keep Maurer at the home until the board could look into the case. A delegation of Spanish-American war veterans will air their grievances at the hearing on July 24. Commandant Riddle is 84 years old and a veteran of the Civil war. The office of commandant at the home has always been held by a veteran of the Civil war.

BERRY PACKING
ALL THIS WEEK

SILVERTON, Ore., July 16.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Work of packing loganberries at the Silverton cannery is expected to continue the rest of this week and possibly part of next. Only enough berries are being received now to make necessary the running of one sorting table. About 12 or 15 women are employed with the packing. The berries are put up in one gallon cans as they are no longer of the best quality.

About 10 women are engaged in labeling cans at present but their services will no longer be necessary when the Knapp labeling machine which has been ordered from Portland is installed. The machine is expected within a day or two.

When the last of the loganberries are received and packed the cannery will shut down until fall. Only a few men will remain at work making necessary repairs and changes.

Two carloads of choice loganberries are being shipped to Portland today as a result of an order from England through Jorgensen, Portland exporter. The berries will be loaded on a ship at Portland and sent to England direct. The cans will be labeled as Oregon fruit.

The remainder of last year's pack, amounting to about 400 cases, has been sold as well as some of the fruit packed this year. Although the demand for loganberries is not very great the price remains unchanged. A number of canneries are attempting to buy fruit from the Silverton cannery to fill orders for which they have not enough cases but the majority of these orders are not being taken as the local cannery does not care to make a business of selling to other canneries.

FOUR AMERICANS
IN TENNIS FINALS

OLYMPIC STADIUM, France, July 16.—(By the AP.)—Only 16 players, eight men and eight women, remained in the running for the Olympic singles championship tonight after the fourth day of play on the courts at Colombes.

Two of the members on the octette surviving in the men's singles are Americans—R. Norris Williams and Vincent Richards. Similarly, two of the eight women who remained in the fight are Americans—Miss Helen Wills and Mrs. Marion Jessup.

In both events the Americans are in opposite halves of the draw, so that all four of them may reach the semi-finals and thereby win points for their country. When the championships end next Sunday, 10 points will be awarded to winners in each event and five to each of their opponents in the final round. The losing players in the semi-finals will play matches among themselves to decide who shall get four points and who shall receive three points.

There is a third American woman among the eight remaining in the women's singles—Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory—but she is wearing the colors of her native Norway. On Friday Mrs. Mallory will play Miss Wills, who de-throned her last year as champion of the United States.

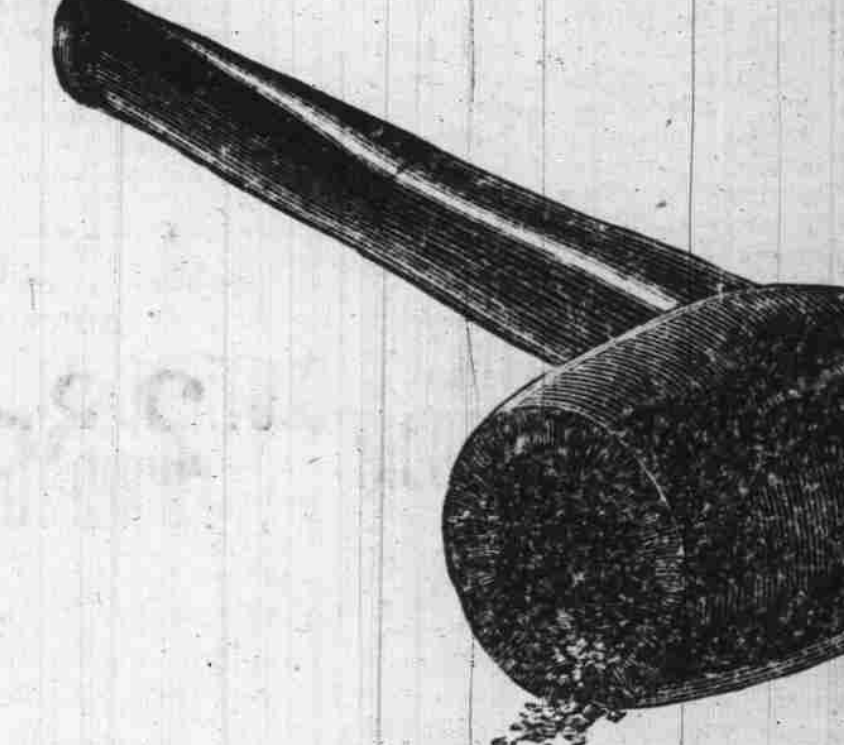
Children Strike Matches Start Dangerous Blaze
