## AUTO RACES NEXT SATURDAY GREAT

Thirty-Five Cars Will Start, and the Event Is Being Well Planned

The final arrangements are being made for the auto races at the state fair grounds on next Saturday afternoon. The tryout is to be at 2; the races start at 2:30.

It is expected that 35 cars will enter. G. W. Lott, manager for the Oregon Auto Race Drivers' association, was making the final arrangements yesterday. He expects to take up the matter of making the races safe with the Salem city council.

As stated in The Statesman of Friday, he expects to have the best police protection ever had on the track; to make it satisfactory to everybody. Frank Irwin, chief of the motorcycle squad of the Portland police force, will furnish night motorcycle officers and start the races himself.

Frank E. Watkins, Guy E. Dickinson and A. M. (Bert) Lee will represent the American Automobile association, and their intention is to make the track absolutely safe and dustless. The referee is to be Mr. Pendergrass, and the timers Geo. Adams of the Covey Motor company and Mr. McKinney of the Franklin Motor company and Mr. Harper of the Zenith Carburetor Distributing company.

Charles J. Lisle, reporting for The Statesman the races last year at the state fair grounds under the management of Mr. Lott, among many complimentary things, said:

**Good Sportsmanship Shown.**  
"There are two ways of being a sport: To grab it all, and to give the other fellow a chance. Last night, in the room of George Lott, who promoted the auto races, Saturday, there was a curious financial play that illustrates the fine kind."

"The money due to McDonald, who won first place in the light car race with the McDonald Special, was \$73. In the later race, McDonald went through the fence and both car and driver were somewhat damaged and of course put out of the race. Manager Lott handed the driver \$109 cash, which no law in the world, except the super-law of clean sportsmanship, called for him to give. The two owners of the car—it wasn't McDonald's own property, he being only the driver—came in, and the roll of money passed around the ring three or four times, with the Statesman man looking on in

amazement, before anybody would peel off even so much as a single 'case.' 'You take it, it's yours,' they said in succession. The spectators practically had to interfere to keep the money from wearing out, and being a dead loss to everybody.

**Whole Program Given.**  
"Now that's sportsmanship. It represents pretty much the attitude that the race management has brought to the show. Good cars were brought in; the races were pulled off as announced; the track was wet down instead of being left dusty as it was last year; the drivers were paid fairly, and generously; the tickets were not unreasonably high in price, and the whole show was aimed to be a real race event."

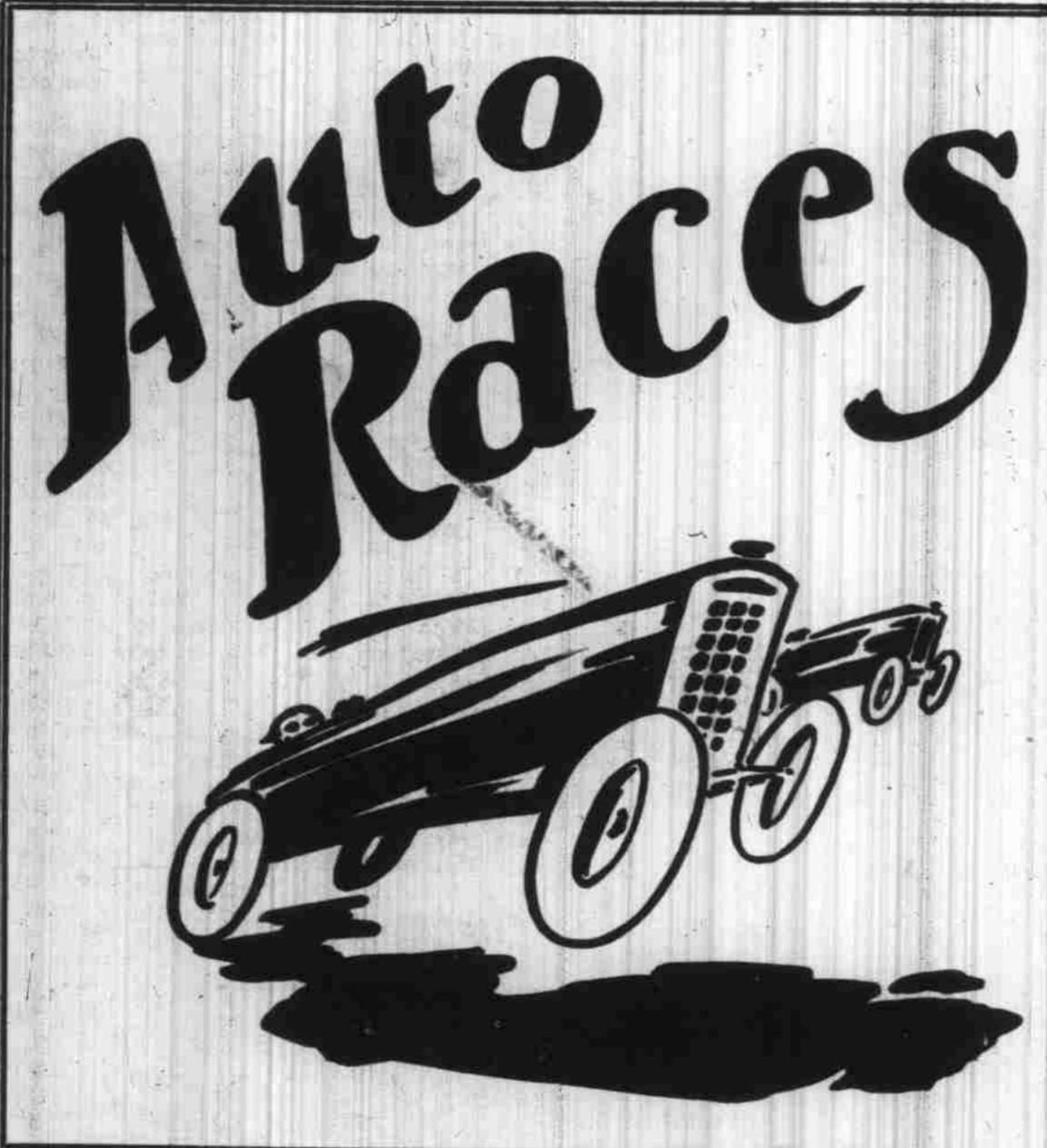
