## PORTLAND LIVESTOCK PAVILION IS BURNED

Many of several hundred cattle in outlying pens to the quick action of William Burns, superintendent. With flames overhead and with the smoke so dense that breathing was difficult, he succeeded, with a small group of men, in opening the gates and driving the cattle to a place of safety.

The exposition will be held in November in spite of the fire, declared O. M. Plummer, general manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition. It is probable that work will be started at once on a new structure. Mr. Plummer made the announcement today after a telephone conversation with E. A. Stuart of Seattle, president. The building was covered by \$350,000 insurance.

Employees of the shingle mill discovered the fire which is thought to have started from a refuse burner near the establishment. The dry condition of the buildings of the plant and the fact that a stiff breeze from the slough of the Columbia river on which it is situated made it impossible to attempt to control. Thirty workmen escaped without injury. The loss to the plant is said to be fully covered by insurance.

## Fine of \$155,712 Levied On Ship for Narcotics

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 23.—A fine of \$155,712.50, equivalent to \$25 for each ounce of narcotics recently said by federal agents to have been smuggled into the city aboard the steamer George Allen, has been assessed against the vessel, John W. Dolson, newly appointed immigration inspector announced today. At the time of the narcotic seizure two Chinese and one white man were arrested aboard a train near Chehalis, Wash., en route to San Francisco. The narcotics were in six trunks on the train.

## RACING CARS ARE ENTERED FOR BIG SATURDAY EVENT

The Salem track is now being put in the best condition for the races to be held July 26th and the public is now assured that there will be no dust and records may be set. Entries have been received from all parts of the country, and drivers are now busy tuning up their cars for this event. In 1919, a record was set of 25 miles in 22 minutes flat, this being a world record which still stands. Officials chosen are, Bert Pendergrass, referee; Frank Irwin, starter; technical board consists of H. G. Gaussen, Bert Lee, A. W. Cheney. Timers will be George W. Bingham, Lloyd Frost, and George Adams.

Invitations have been sent to Mayor Baker of Portland and Mayor Giesy of Salem, and Governor Pierce, who has accepted our invitation and will be present at this racing meet. T. A. Raffety, state traffic officer, has also accepted an invitation. A. H. Lea, formerly secretary of the Oregon state fair board, will also be a guest.
