Of the total number reported 529 were subject to provisions of the compensation act, 66 were from firms and corporations which rejected the act and none from public utilities. The fatalities were John T. O'Hara, Knappa, time-keeper; W. George Hutchinson, Klamath Falls, carpenter, and A. Debois, Elgin, carpenter.
