One of the richest and most elaborate, as well as the most expensive, of the frozen-dessert family is the mousse. It may be composed wholly of frozen whipped cream and fruit pulp or it may be stiffened with gelatin, but it is always frozen without stirring and should have a mosslike texture when cut.

Basic recipe for Mousses—1 cup to 1 pint of drained fruit pulp flavored with juice of one-half lemon, 1 pint whipping cream, pinch salt, 1 cup powdered sugar.

Add the salt and sugar to the cream and beat until stiff throughout. Sometimes it is necessary to drain the whipped cream no a fine sieve. Fold in the drained and sweetened fruit-pulp. The fruit-pulp may be stiffened by adding a teaspoon of gelatin, which has been soaked in two tablespoons of cold water and melted over hot water. The fruit pulp should then be set on ice until it begins to stiffen before the cream is folded in. Put in a mold and pack in equal parts of ice and salt and let stand for three hours.

Crushed bananas, strawberries, raspberries and peaches may be used in making mousses. If desired, the fruit-pulp may be omitted. One tablespoon of

gelatin soaked in one-fourth cup of cold water and melted over hot water may be mixed with the sugar and added to the whipped cream and the flavoring added, the mousse taking the name of the flavor used.—From the Bellator.
