OREGON GUARDSMEN HIGHLY COMMENDED

Brig. Gen. George A. White, who commanded the Oregon troops at Camp Lewis, is again singled out by the army inspectors for special commendation covering several paragraphs, and ten of his officers are named as having displayed exceptional and marked ability.

All officers but one is rated by the government as "efficient" for field duty of the 147 Oregon unit commanders and staffs. Other officers commended for marked efficiency are Lieut. Col. Eugene Libby, 186th infantry; Major Harry C. Brumbaugh, brigade staff; Majors Fred M. West and Leo J. A. Pironi, and Captains Alvin C. Baker, Fred J. Mahne, Frederick L. Wiegand, and Lieut. Frederick L. Krueger, all of the 162nd infantry; Major Charles E. Gjedsted and First Lieut. Claude B. Washburne, of the 249th artillery.

Commending General White's service as commander of the troops and camp, the report says: "He set a high mark for his officers and enlisted men in respect to command and discipline. He lived up to the requirements himself and required every officer man to do the same. He was firm but just, and the knowledge that no lapses would be tolerated caused a strict adherence to the best conduct and application to duty that could be required. The brigade combat maneuvers were carried out in excellent manner, due to the qualities of leadership of the commanding general and the excellent morale and discipline he inspired."

Special commendation in various parts of the field work is given to the 162d and 186th infantry regiments, Battery A, field artillery, the coast defense command; Company A, 116th engineers; hospital company No. 167, and the 1st officers and men. Army officers inspecting and reporting upon the Oregon command, in addition to General Alexander, included Col. George G. Gately, commander of an artillery brigade in France during the war; Col. Robert McCleave, chief of staff of the First-Fifty-first division, and Col. E. A. Sirmeyer and Lieut. Colonel Robert S. Pith and John R. Kelley of the army headquarters staff at San Francisco; Maj. George C. Donaldson of the Seventh infantry, and Maj. J. B. Corby of the Fourth infantry.

Squirrel poisoning activities in the state of Oregon for the spring of 1924 were of record breaking proportions. A total of 96,475 pounds of poisoned grain were distributed through the various county agents' offices of Oregon to the farmers of the respective counties. In addition to the great amount of poison used on private land, 46,920 acres of government land were poisoned to July 1, in various parts of the state. The great bulk of this was in Lake and Baker counties, and the work after July 1, will be in Crook and Wallowa counties.

Baker and Union counties ran a neck and neck race for first honors in the amount of poison used, each using 13,000 pounds of poison at latest reports. Crook, Klamath, and Wallowa counties all used from 7000 to 9000 pounds each.

Wallowa county was the first county in Oregon to use calcium cyanide against Columbian ground squirrels. Two tons of this material were shipped into the county by the county court and results so far reported have been very satisfactory. We are watching the development of the use of this material with a great deal of interest.

Mr. Moore established several more of the Willamette Valley rocket popper demonstration plots in Benton county. These plots will be established at various points in the Willamette valley as fast as feasible.

The Rodent office will have something new in the way of exhibits at the fall fairs. Mr. Moore has been working some time on this matter and we expect to have something of especial interest to the farmers and cooperators this fall.
