GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 28.—Mannal S. Painter, Grand Rapids man who wrote to Judge John R. Given Silverton Twins

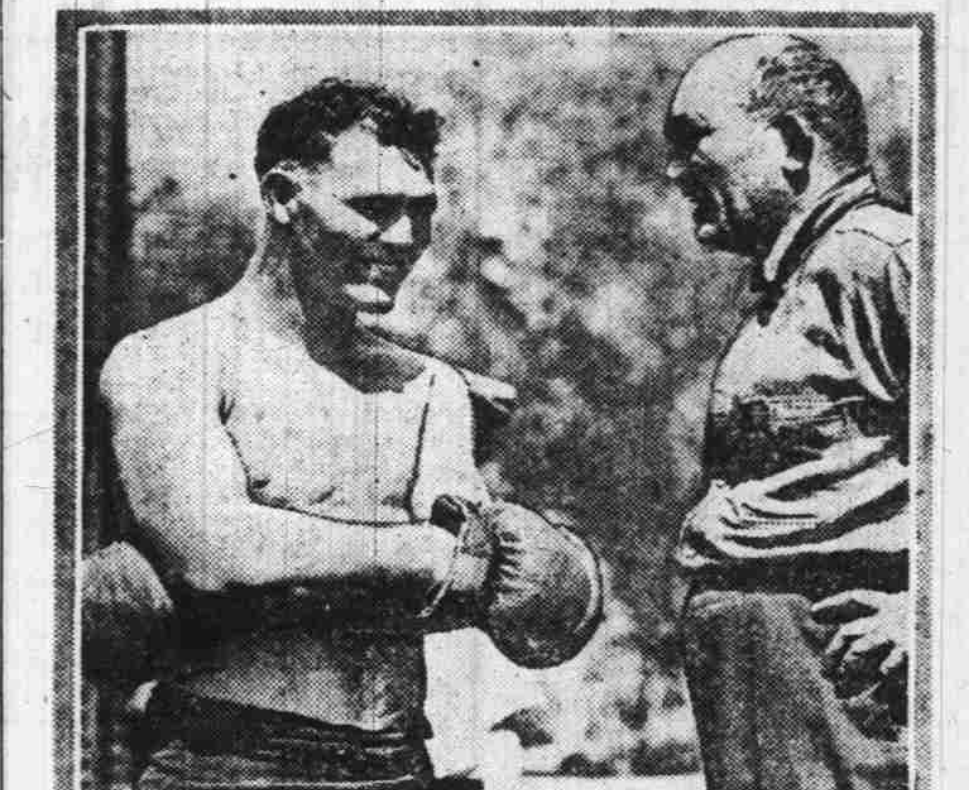

Walnut Growers Will
Visit Local Orchards

Walnut orchards in the Salem district will be visited on the seventh annual excursion of the Western Walnut Growers association, beginning August 20, according to Knight Percy. The caravan will have between 40 and 50 automobiles, starting at Silverton. Discussions will be held that night in Salem at the chamber of commerce rooms, with orchards near Salem and in Polk county to be visited the following day.

Orchards to be visited are those of Sam Ames, Dr. C. E. Keene, Charles Hines, Roy Morley and T. K. Brokke, near Silverton; Charles L. McNary, William Blake,



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and tractors, and the water is being forced through canvas hose, running from 500 to 1200 gallons a minute. It is not much more expensive than spraying against the red spider, and is much more efficient.

Picking will start in the vicinity of Harrisburg next Monday, though late hops will not be harvested until about September 1. Where the red spider has been the picking is bad and will probably start about August 25. Some aphids is appearing, but little attention is being given it by the growers.
