HAS PULLED OVER 120 ACRES OF FLAX

A. E. Bradley, Aumsville Grower, Still Going Strong With Machine

A. E. Bradley of Aumsville had, up to last night, pulled over 120 acres of flax during the present season with his machine, and he has at least two weeks of pulling yet ahead of him. He has averaged six acres a day, making his start on the seventh of July.

This is the world's record. It is possible that he may reach 200 acres by the season. Multiply 200 by \$30, and you have \$6000. That is what hand pulling would cost if it could be accomplished at all, counting \$20 an acre for the labor cost, which is and has been the ruling price, and \$10 an acre for securing and transporting and caring for the men and women and children engaged in the hand pulling.

Another Record

Ball Bros. of Turner, working near Independence, in 19 hours this week, pulled seventeen and a half acres of flax. That is the record in this respect. It amounts to about 10 acres a day, running the machine from daylight to dark.

The Bradley machine is the one that was rushed here from Canada last year by express, and made a trial run the last part of the flax harvest of about 50 acres, proving its efficiency, and leading to the fleet of new machines that came this year.

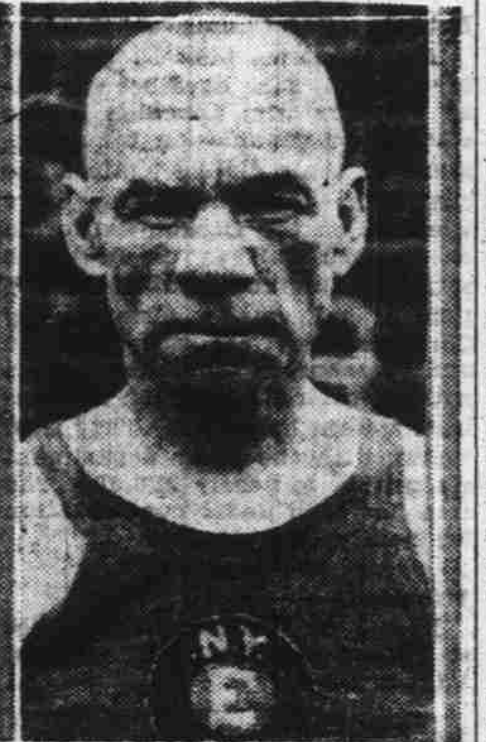
Women Appreciate It

With the larger acreage, they would have had their troubles piled Pelion on Ossa, to their back breaking and nerve wrecking limit. But the pullers,

have come along and cut out all their worries and work. The flax pulling machines have pointed the way to flax growing here in large fields. They have pointed the way to the full development of the manufacturing industry, from the retting and scutching to the weaving of the fine linens of commerce. They have pointed the way to the biggest manufacturing industry in Oregon, of which we will hear and witness more and more as the days pass, in this coming Belfast district than that of the old world; meaning a million people employed directly and indirectly, and then on up to other millions.

The Karam system is a briefer one than the Gregg, much more quickly learned, and serves the purpose for many whose work in a general office is not heavy. It has not yet been used sufficiently long to know whether it will serve for heavy office work court reporting, but it is ideal for newspaper reporters, students in colleges who wish to take notes of lectures, and others who wish to make and preserve notes for numerous individuals.

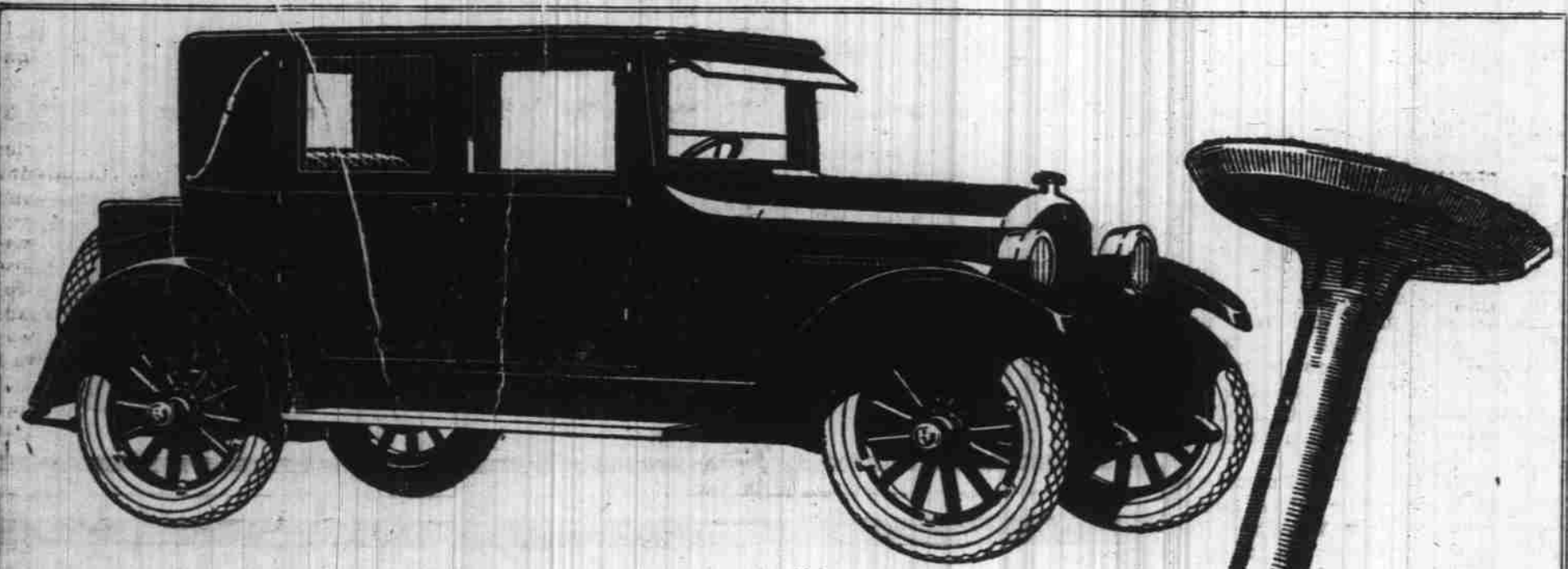
