LOS ANGELES, Aug. 2.—William Harrison Dempsey, heavyweight boxing champion of the world, will not defend his title in a bout this year. It was announced here today by Jack Kearns, the champion's manager.

The champion is now nearing the end of his motion picture contract and plans to forsake the studio in about three weeks. He then will go east to start a "personal appearance" tour in conjunction with the showing of his pictures.

"It's a disappointment," commented Kearns, "but we will make it up next summer. Either Willis or Firpo will be first on our program and maybe Gibbons or some one else later."

"I looked in all directions for a possible landing spot and have never yet spied one. Some one might think a sandy desert is smooth, but not the Sind desert; rolling, hilly and cactus-infested."

"Although the old liberty broke a connecting rod and vibrated badly, she plugged on and we finally arrived over the airdrome at Karachi, much relieved. Both of us, and the entire plane, were covered with oil and hot as fire. Surely lucky though to have our engine keep on as it did and take us out of the position in which we were."

painting at the Lane Morley grocery store. The questioning took place during the noon hour.

Attention to the possibility of some connection between Mr. McCann and the missing murderer was called by M. Randolph, 125 River street, and Ward K. Richardson, north Salem grocer. Mr. McCann came to Salem about May 1 and his subsequent talk regarding the case resulted in the suspicion that he might be connected with the murder.

Mr. McCann told the Statesman last night that he had been stopped at Sherwood shortly after the murder in Portland and questioned regarding his business. After frankly answering all questions, he proceeded to his home at Dallas for a few days before coming to Salem. He was not arrested at that time, the officers explaining that they had instructions to stop and question all strangers.

Contrary to being an "itinerant painter," Mr. McCann has been a resident of Dallas for several years, where his father has some business interests. He was practically raised in or near Salem.

country and we seldom vary more than five or ten miles off. Well, we got a kick out of it anyway, that we will never forget. To have landed out there would certainly have meant the wrecking of or at least the breaking of our plane. Ten to one, though, we would not have been scratched, as we could possibly have gotten the plane down in one of the dry river beds of sand and without crashing it into anything, such as a ditch, tree or such.

"To date, we have covered 16-180 miles with about 225 hours flying and not one forced landing, so I am satisfied. Our close call near Karachi was just a mechanical defect—something no one could foresee.

"Feel fine and am quite well. Glad I got through the Orient and the tropics without fever or the like. Hope to be near Boston by August 10."

Lieutenant Harding, native of Nashville, Tenn., June 2, 1896, is a descendant of Gen. William Giles Harding, owner of the renowned Bell Meade where America's foremost racehorses were bred. He is companion to Lieut. Eric Nelson, on the world flyer New Orleans.

Hughes to Be Royally Entertained By Germans
