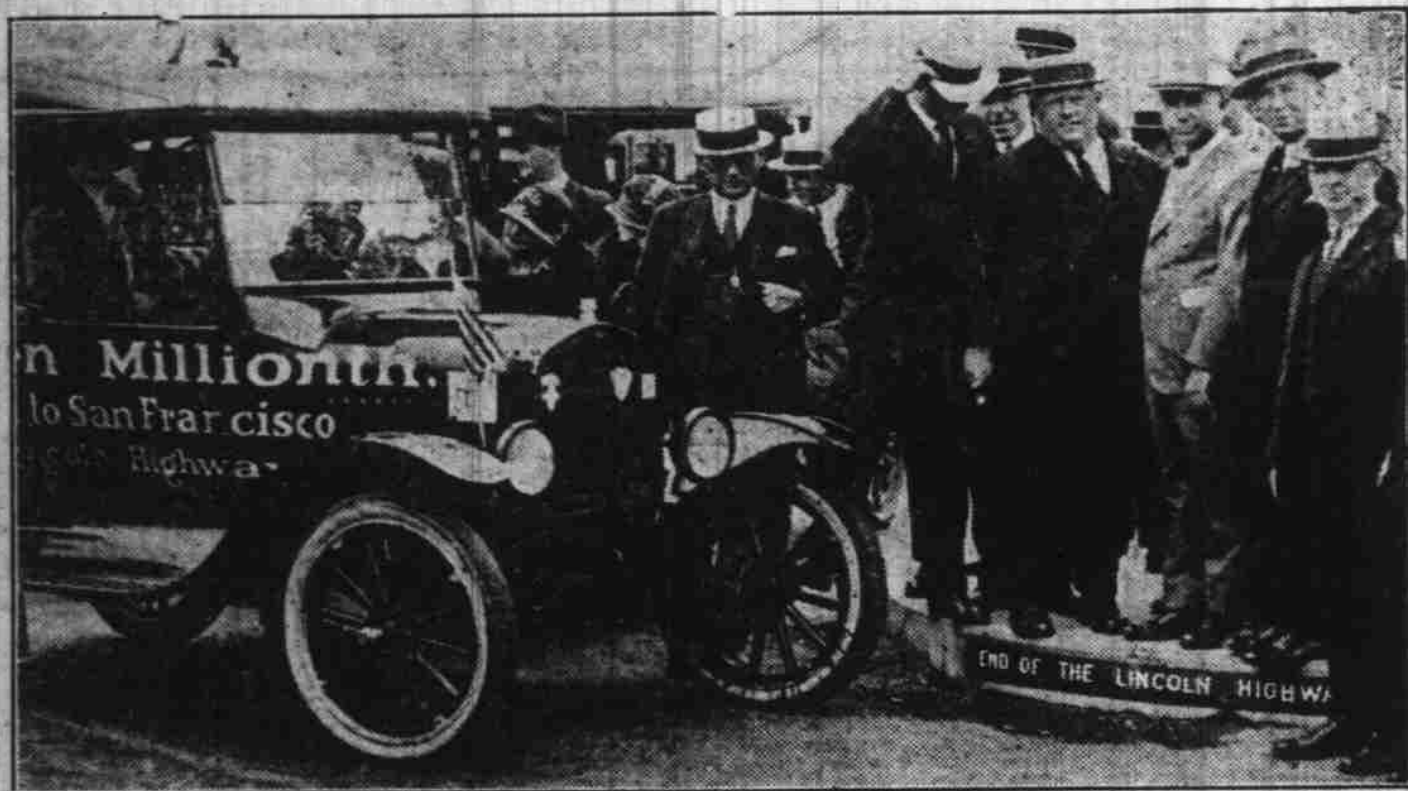

FAMOUS FORD TO BE SALEM GUEST

Ten-Millionth Car to Be Built By Manufacturer on Continental Trip

The ten-millionth Ford, now en route north on the Pacific highway, will arrive in Salem early Saturday afternoon, August 9, and will remain here over Sunday.

Arrangements are being completed by the Valley Motor company to accord the car a big reception here in which a number of officials will participate and join in welcoming the car and its famous driver, Frank Kulick, who years ago piloted Ford racing cars to victory and broke many records.

The car will come into the city at the head of an extensive parade and Ford dealers from a num-

ber of nearby cities will be here to take part in the demonstration for the sturdy little car which signifies a new and outstanding achievement in the automotive history of America.

The Ten-Millionth Ford completed its eventful tour across the country from New York to San Francisco on July 29 and the present trip, which extends the journey, comes as the result of many requests for the car from all parts of the country.

Everywhere along the line, since the Ten-Millionth started from New York it has been welcomed by enthusiastic crowds, city, state and county officials joining in the receptions.

Hits were few on both sides in the Salem-Kelso game yesterday, but the margin was in Kelso's favor and the Timbo Wolves beat the Senators by a score of 8 to 2. Davis, the Kelso pitcher, did brilliant work, allowing only three hits, and Winters, the Salem twirler, yielded only six safeties.

Proctor, Salem second baseman, got a homer in the second inning that netted the Senators' two tallies. A home run by Krands of Kelso in the third was good for two runs, making a total of three in that inning, and Harper got a homer in the ninth when a like number of runs were scored.

The game was snappy most of the time. The two teams will play again at Oxford field this afternoon, the game starting at 5:10 o'clock. Kuss will pitch for Kelso today. 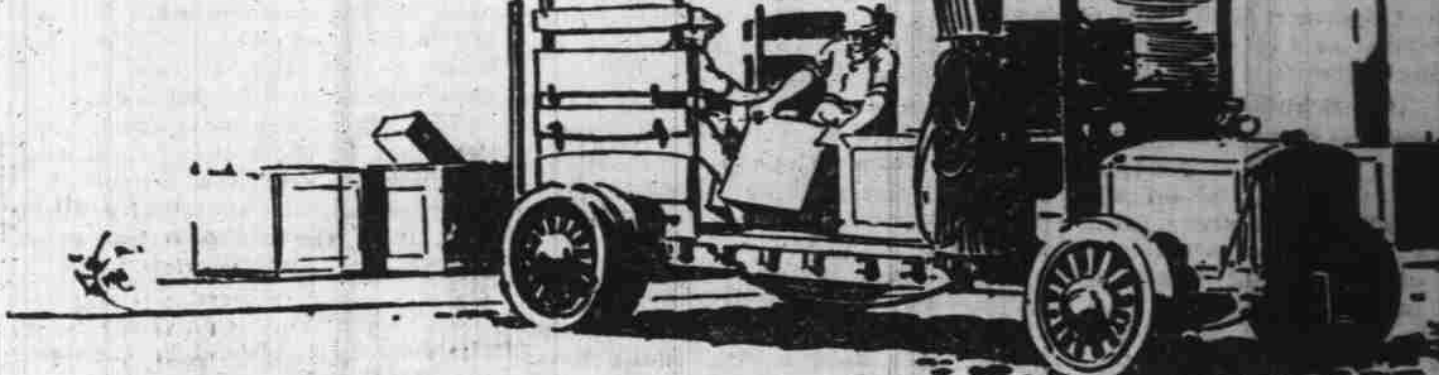
