

## SECOND OREGON HAS REUNION

Gathering in Laurelhurst Park Sunday Notable Event for Veterans

Laurelhurst park in Portland was the scene Sunday afternoon of the third annual reunion of 200 Spanish war veterans with their families and friends. The occasion was also the 25th anniversary of the return of the unit from the islands.

Col. Percy Willis presided at the gathering as chairman. An extended program was given. H. L. Rogers, Robert S. Muston, George A. Hartman, L. A. Harms, J. M. Poorman and Gen. George A. White, Judge C. A. Johns, Hon. A. L. Barber and George G. L. Snyder being among those making talks.

Mr. Poorman recalled with vividness the incident in the war in which E. B. Millard, as a leading figure, was left as killed in an

unusually harrowing ambush attack.

George A. Hartman of Company D spoke particularly in relation to the soldier loan for Spanish American veterans who have never received any official compensation.

A further interesting matter brought up was that relating to the alleged desire for independence in the islands. Judge C. A. Johns expressed himself in the light that it was a matter of propaganda; that the inhabitants of the island were entirely satisfied with the present control.

The reunion for next year will be held again in Laurelhurst park, the second Sunday in August.

## LOGAN JUICE AND JAM AND JELLY TOO

People of Salem are Asked to Try Local Products and Help Boost Them

The people of Salem are being asked by the loganberry growers to assist in finding a market for their product. The interests of the city and country are mutual, and with our great acreage of loganberries we can bring millions of dollars to this valley annually if there is a market. The regular markets have not been able to absorb the product and the plan has been hit upon to have the people of Salem buy some themselves, and also write to their friends in the east asking them to buy the product.

The growers feel that they have a product that will give value received in every instance, and the people of Salem can afford to ask their friends to buy it. In fact they are doing their friends a favor by calling their attention to the delicious products of the loganberry vine.

**Three Products Offered**  
J. E. Crothers has been taking an interest in the sale of the loganberry locally, and he is very anxious to establish a market for the product of the growers around Salem. There are three kinds of products offered for sale.

The first is a pure loganberry juice which has been generally exploited and favorably received. Then there is the jelly made from loganberry juice and Hood River Mountain Maid pectin. Will Busick pronounces this an unusually fine jelly, and his familiarity with jellies is well known. In addition to this jelly there has been prepared some jam which is pronounced by all who have tasted it as being a delight to the palate and a joy to the housewife in selecting the delicacies of her menu.

**Will Canvass Salem**  
Under the guidance of Mr. Crothers the plan is being perfected to canvass the city. The women will be asked to buy one or all kinds of these products. They will also be asked to write letters to their friends recommending these products and ask them to send an order. The women will not be expected to do this until they have consumed their supply, or at least enough of it to warrant them asking their friends to purchase.

Mr. Crothers believes that every woman in Salem who purchases will be a booster for the loganberry and will be glad of the opportunity of helping the growers in the surrounding territory to find a market for their crops.

It is possible to reach out from Salem in this way and find a market for a good many tons of loganberries, and many believe that these tons marketed in this way will take up the surplus and enable the regular markets to handle the crop in future years.

Liberty Loganberry Juice is the trade name of the bottled article being exploited by Mr. Crothers, whose farm with his loganberry plantation is on route 4, in the Liberty district.

The jam goes under the title of Sun Jam, and it is especially fine with ice cream as a sundae. The products are so good that if their merits can be made known over a sufficiently wide territory they will certainly result in a great revival in the loganberry industry.
