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Walnut growing pays in California on \$2500 an acre irrigated land. We produce a better walnut here, selling at 2 to 5 cents a pound higher, on \$50 to \$100 an acre land, and without irrigation. Harvesting here costs about half what it costs in California, owing to the fact that our nuts ripen uniformly and drop free from the hull, while they stick to the hull down there, on account of the high temperature and the longer harvest due to the irrigation. The kernels of the California walnuts become dark and tend to a rancid condition owing to high temperatures. Our walnuts escape these defects; hence the higher quality and prices for our walnuts. The difference in price, extra cost of harvesting and cost of irrigation will pay the expenses of care and harvesting here in Oregon—to say nothing of the lower priced walnut lands here. No wonder we have a nut boom here. It should be ten times more intense than it is now. It will be, whenever it is put over right. The industry is solid and substantial here. We can stand up against the world with our walnut industry, and our filbert industry. Absolutely. If you are nutty on walnuts and filberts, you are a walking advertisement for a line that is destined to help make this the richest district on the round earth.

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MAYORS TO AID IN DEFENSE DAY

Letter to City Executives By Governor Asks for Committees

Organization of patriotic meetings over the state for national defense test day was set in motion yesterday by Governor Pierce when he addressed letters to the mayor of every city in Oregon asking cooperation in making September 12 a success in Oregon. The governor asked each mayor to name a local committee whose function it would be to arrange for some sort of patriotic meeting. In places where units of the citizen soldiery are located he suggested that the exercises be held in conjunction with the mobilization test called for by Secretary Weeks.

At the same time defense test headquarters was established at Salem in the offices of George A. White, commander of the 82nd brigade, and who was designated by Governor Pierce to coordinate the national program in Oregon and carry forward the preparations for the day in cooperation with the state committee representing the various patriotic and military organizations in the state. In his letters to the mayors Governor Pierce suggests the desirability of making the national program a complete success in Oregon, and urges upon the mayors naming of committees composed of representatives of patriotic bodies to take charge of the program in the city. He gives the view that "in a well maintained provision for the national defense and an active interest in patriotic matters our national security depends."

The nature of the program in each city is left up to the local committee, including the hour at which the meeting be held, as the governor has indicated that he will not proclaim the day a holiday, believing that the program can be carried out in the evening without interfering with the day's work. In this view he is said to have the approval of the majority of the state committee, which will not ask the governor for a holiday proclamation.

The governor's letter setting the plans for the day in active operation follows: "I am asked by the government to cooperate in the matter of a test of our national defense to be held September 12 of this year, the sixth anniversary of the battle of St. Mihiel.

"Inasmuch as I am in hearty accord with the government plan, believing that in a well maintained provision for our national defense and an active interest in patriotic matters, our national security depends, I am very desirous that Oregon's part in the national program be successful in the fullest degree.

"Patriotic exercises of some sort, in which the higher duties and responsibilities of American citizenship are discussed by speakers selected for the occasion, suggest themselves as being highly appropriate for this occasion. In cities where there are national guard or reserve corps organizations the exercises should be conducted in conjunction with the local instruction test mobilization which has been ordered by the secretary of war.

"I am asking you as the mayor to name a committee to take active charge of the patriotic program in your city. Such committee ordinarily should include representatives of the local patriotic organizations, such as the American legion, Grand Army, foreign war veterans, disabled veterans, Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution, national guard, reserve corps, etc.

"Detailed information and suggestions will be sent you from defense test headquarters at Salem from time to time, but it is highly desirable that your local committee be named by you immediately. "Will you please advise me of your action in this matter. I would also appreciate any information you can give me now as to your probable plans for the day, as well as any suggestions you may desire to offer."

McCOY ADMITS KILLING WOMAN IN APARTMENTS

which she kept in a drawer, and I jumped up to keep her from shooting herself; but she pulled the trigger just as I reached her. "After the first shot she fell into my arms and I placed her on the floor. She died with my arms around her, trying to speak to me.

"I placed a sheet over her and then put my picture in her folded arms. I was covered with blood, so first washed myself and then got my revolver and started out to kill Albert E. Mors, the man who caused it all.

"I did not find him, but if I had I would have shot him down. I am sorry I didn't find him." Between mouthfuls of food, in jerky sentences, skipping from the beginning to the end, from the apartment shooting to the boulevard bullet orgy, McCoy related how he stayed in the apartment with Mrs. Mors' body, for several hours before beginning his search for her former husband.

"I loved her," he explained, "I loved her as I never loved a woman before. She is dead now, but I still love her; I don't care what becomes of me now."

"I was going to marry her just as soon as we could get things

right-side up again. Now this thing has happened."

Of the wild scenes in the Mors antique shop and at the shop of Sam Schapp and his wife nearby, where he held up customers and forced some of them to disrobe before the attempt of one of them to resist brought on the shooting affray, the former pugilist said wearily:

"I was out of my head. My lights went out when I saw the woman dead at my feet.

"You see, boys," he pleaded, "this is the way the whole thing happened. The lights went out for me and then I wanted to kill. My little girl was dead and I didn't want to live, and I wanted to take a few people with me.

"I was going to kill myself," he added, "but I forgot."

"There is no doubt in our minds that McCoy killed Mrs. Mors," said Captain of Detectives Home tonight. It is the police theory that the former ring champion shot and killed Mrs. Mors in a fit of rage when he learned that she intended to break off her relations with him. Then, they allege, he set out to slay the woman's former husband also, and, failing to find him, opened fire on persons in and near Mors' shop some of whom he blamed for Mrs. Mors' changed attitude.

District Attorney Asa Keyes announced he would question McCoy and all witnesses of the boulevard shooting early tomorrow and would present the evidence to the grand jury as soon as possible.

Meanwhile McCoy occupies a cell at the city jail, booked on suspicion of murder, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to murder, and robbery.

construction of a monument to those who were leaders in the great rebellion against it. The statues are those of Jefferson Davis, Robert E. Lee, Stonewall Jackson and other confederates.

"Would it be proper to suggest to the secretary of the treasury," he continued, "who is to determine the matter, that upon one side of the coin should be the face of Jefferson Davis, surrounded by his name and the words: 'The head and the foot of the great rebellion,' and on the opposite the words: 'The United States of America this does honor to treason.' Three candidates are in the field to succeed General Saltzger as commander in chief. They are: John B. Inman, of Springfield,

Ill., Louis F. Arenberg, of Uniontown, Pa., and L. F. Hawk, of Los Angeles.

Agriculture on Road to Recovery Says Meyer

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Agriculture has definitely turned the corner and is on the road to permanent recovery, Eugene Meyer, Jr., managing director of the war finance corporation, reported today to President Coolidge after a trip of inspection through the west.

"Conditions everywhere in the west," Mr. Meyer said, "are improving rapidly. It is the most radical improvement in agriculture in years. The most hopeful sign is the trend toward purchasing of farm lands. The farmers are finally getting out of the hole."

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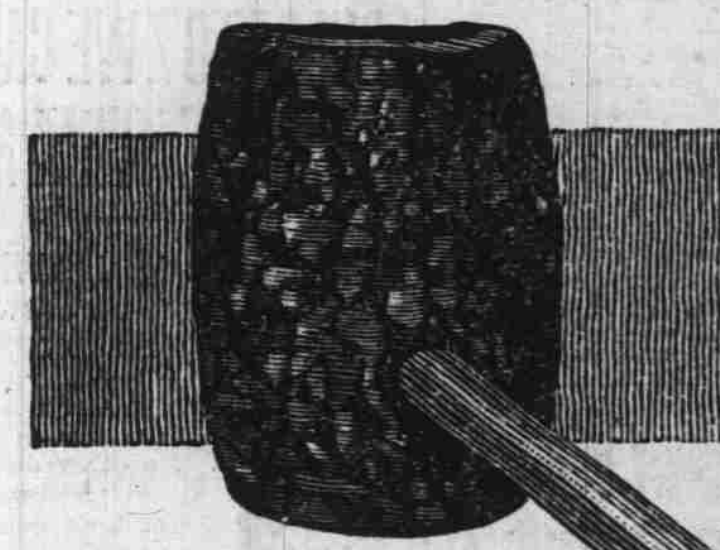
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
