### Treasurer Makes Report on Funds

Balance of More Than \$7,000,000 Now on Hand, Says Statement

State Treasurer Jefferson Myers reports \$7,752,369.44 as the total balance on hand in the state treasury as of July 31, and investments aggregating \$7,072,898.53.

The total balance is made up of the following items:

General fund, \$1,834,441.19; common school interest, \$394,171.97; common school principal, \$47,186.95; agricultural college principal, \$227,236; agricultural college interest, \$352,663; university fund interest, \$659.02; university fund principal, \$202,736; A. R. Burbank principal, \$405.39; A. R. Burbank interest, \$170.1; Thurston monument fund, \$28.25; industrial accident fund, \$74,562.31; segregated accident fund, \$231,369.71; catastrophe fund, \$32,552.39; rehabilitation fund, \$22,597.31; rehabilitation cooperative vocational, \$4197.08; Oregon soldiers' home national, \$20,554.35; Oregon soldiers' home (under direction state board of control), \$2586.48; state fair, \$2055.39; University of Oregon Villard endowment, \$4518.35; Oregon irrigation, \$1404.09; rural credits loan, \$7935.05; rural credits expense, \$721.20; vocational education, \$16,597.73; state time board sinking fund, \$289.20; state highway fund, \$3,272,122.03; irrigation district interest, \$1075.03; World war veterans' state aid fund, \$1,582,873.95; World war veterans' state aid sinking fund, \$187,656.56; total, \$7,752,369.44.

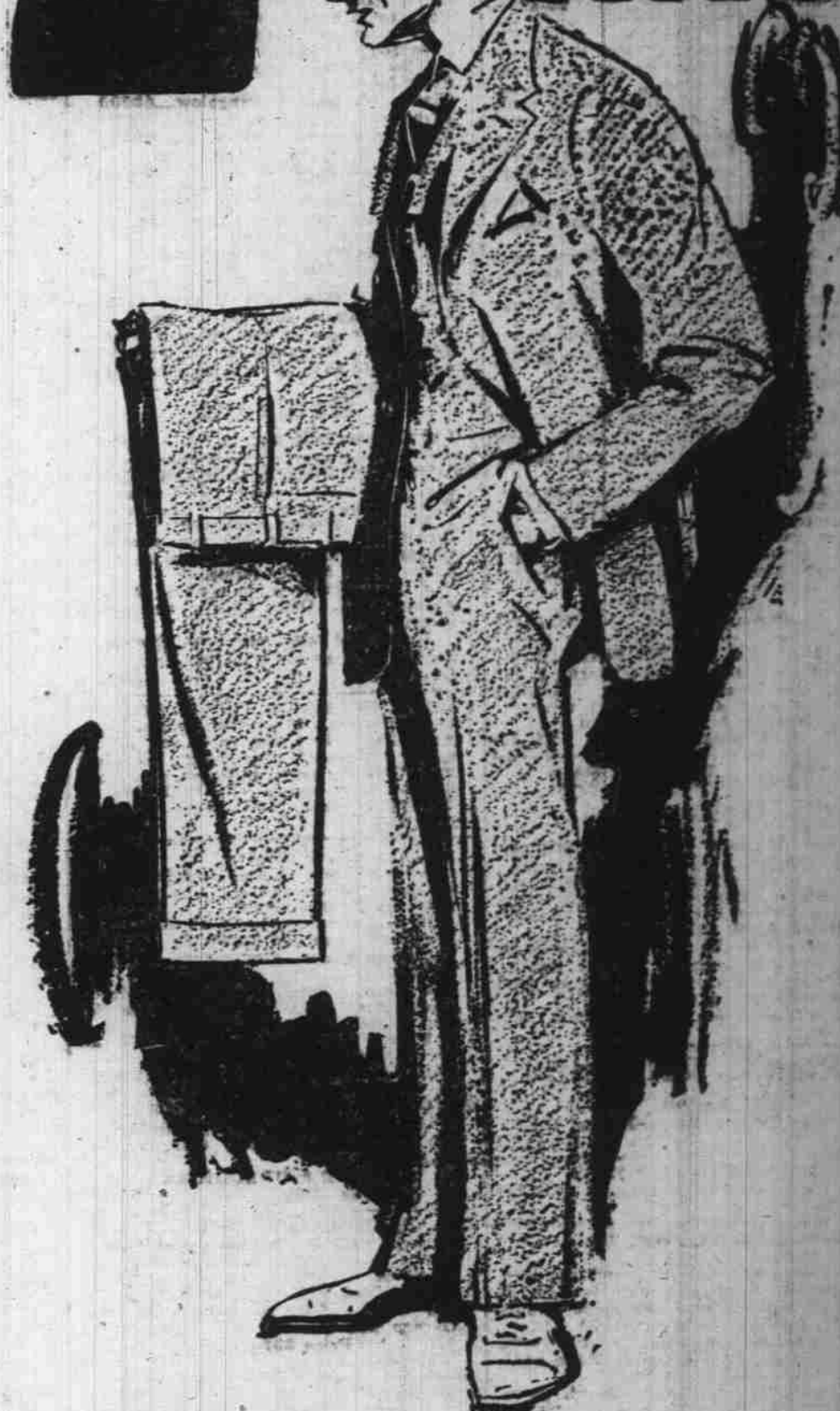

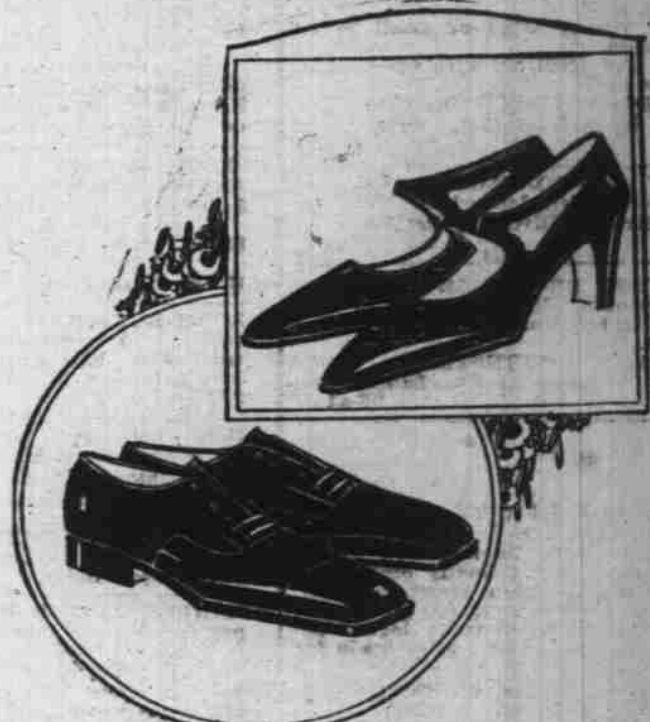
