ABUNDANT AVAILABLE "WHITE COAL" TO MAKE SALEM MANUFACTURING CENTER

More Than 150,000 Horsepower Is Near; More Than 250,000 Horsepower in a Radius of 100 Miles; and Her Share of Three or Four Million Horsepower Available Ultimately—This Great Resource Cannot Be Advertised Too Much—Oak Grove Project as Close to Salem as to Portland

Some day there will be sugar factories in Salem; probably soon. Some day potato starch and dextrine and flour factories will be here. Likely the beginning will be soon. Some day \$100,000,000 of flax and hemp products will be manufactured annually in the Salem district; and then \$200,000,000 worth annually, and more; and there will be hundreds of other factories here, large and small—and the power used will be largely "white coal" power; water power; hydro-electric.

Some day Salem will be a great factory center; and the "wheels" will be turned by the power of the water running down the hills and mountains from the "Cascades" frozen gorges, and from the defiles of the Coast Range.

The water power resources available in Salem cannot be too often referred to; cannot be too much advertised.

"Look to the hills whence cometh your help," was spoken in a different connection in olden times by the writer of holy writ; but the hills are to become in good time the greatest help of the industrially great city that will grow in and around Salem.

The total available undeveloped horsepower in the above enumerated projects alone foot up 139,218. They are all within 50 miles of Salem, and most of them nearer than that. Within the same radius there are many water powers that have not been surveyed or estimated; some small ones, and many that would show up to be of considerable size upon examination.

And Salem's use of it will no doubt grow fast. The power used for machinery and lights by the Salem paper mill equals the volume used in all the rest of Salem—partly because the heavy load in the rest of the city is for only about eight hours; while in the paper mill, it is steady during all of the 24-hour day. This explains why power for such factories can be supplied at a much lower rate than must apply to power for machinery and lights that have their peak loads once in a day, and for the greater part of the 24 hour day use little or no power at all.

Partially Developed Powers

The partially developed water powers in Salem and vicinity, so far listed at the office of the state engineer, show the use of slightly less than 6000 horsepower, and available on full development 10,629 horsepower. They are as follows:

A Little Farther Away

A little farther away from Salem, but easily available for use here, there are at least 100,000 horsepower of water powers on the McKenzie river. And nothing has been said in the above or less of available power running to waste down the Coast Range, that could be easily be made available for use in Salem.

Had You Thought of This?

The Portland Electric Power company, serving Salem and the surrounding country and towns and cities, is developing what it calls its Oak Grove Project. The whole development will bring in 105,000 horsepower; will be the greatest project of the kind now under process of full headway in the northwest; and its total cost will be about \$10,000,000. Its great value will hinge on the fact that this will be a steady—just the same the whole year through. Had you realized that this is as much a Salem project as it is a Portland project—that the Oak Grove plant is on the upper reaches of the Clackamas river, and about the same distance from Salem as from Portland—about 60 miles on an air line? The water flowing to the great plants comes from the eastern ends of both Clackamas and Marion counties; about as much from Marion as from Clackamas—and a good deal of it from Marion county comes from the eternal snows of Mt. Jefferson.

What is more, the great wheels up there in the Cascades, in the Oak Grove plant, will always give

TEN MILLION DOLLARS ANNUALLY ON THE PAYROLLS OF SALEM CONCERNS

This is Thought to Be a Conservative Estimate, the Industrial Payrolls Making Up More Than a Third of the Whole—Best Showing for a City of Salem's Size in the Whole Northwest for Volume of Money Paid to Wage Earners

As a city with a payroll, Salem stands pre-eminent in the northwest, for a city of her size, according to those who have made a careful study of industrial conditions surrounding cities of 20,000 to 25,000 people. The metropolitan district of Salem, that is, Salem and its suburbs, now contains not far from 25,000 people. The population of the city proper is now about 22,500.

The industrial payroll of the city approximates \$3,500,000, with capital investments of around \$10,000,000, and output of around \$25,000,000 annually. There have been large additions the past year to paper mill capital, output and payroll, and the same is true as to the canneries, the automotive industries, and throughout almost the whole list under the heading of industrial establishments.

The trade payroll of the city is estimated at \$2,750,000 annually; that is, the amount paid out in wages by the various retail establishments throughout the city; and including a growing amount of wages paid out by the wholesale houses and jobbers of Salem.

The state payroll is about \$1,500,000 annually. It runs around \$125,000 a month. There can be added to this at least \$500,000 for the Salem United States Indian training school, the Salem school district, the city of Salem, the county of Marion, Willamette University, and the various other branches of the public service, and the other educational institutions.

In addition to these payrolls, there is the vast amount paid out annually from fruit tracts within the trading area of Salem, estimated at about \$1,500,000. This farm payroll begins with the gooseberry and strawberry picking, and continues 'till into the rains of winter, when the last of the apples and pears are harvested. It reaches its height in the hop picking season, which is now on, when thousands of people come within the trading area of Salem, where may be found nearly all of the hop acreage of the state—and Oregon is the greatest of the hop growing states in point of acreage and production; and overlapping hop picking and drying comes prune picking and drying. There is work on the fruit and nut farms all the year through; and on the dairy and stock farms—and for we have seed time and harvest every month, and every day in the year.

With all these payrolls, it is estimated that more than \$10,000,000 is paid out annually within Salem and within the area that does practically all its trading in Salem.
