Rate Case to Continue—Through an agreement between the public service commission and attorneys for the carriers, Judges Kelly and Bingham of the circuit court for Marion county have set October 13 as the date to proceed with a hearing of the farm products rate case which was appealed by the carriers from the commission to the court. The order of the commission reducing the rates was remanded to the commission by the court and a modified order was issued about two weeks ago, increasing the rates above those in the original order, but keeping them lower than those now prevailing.

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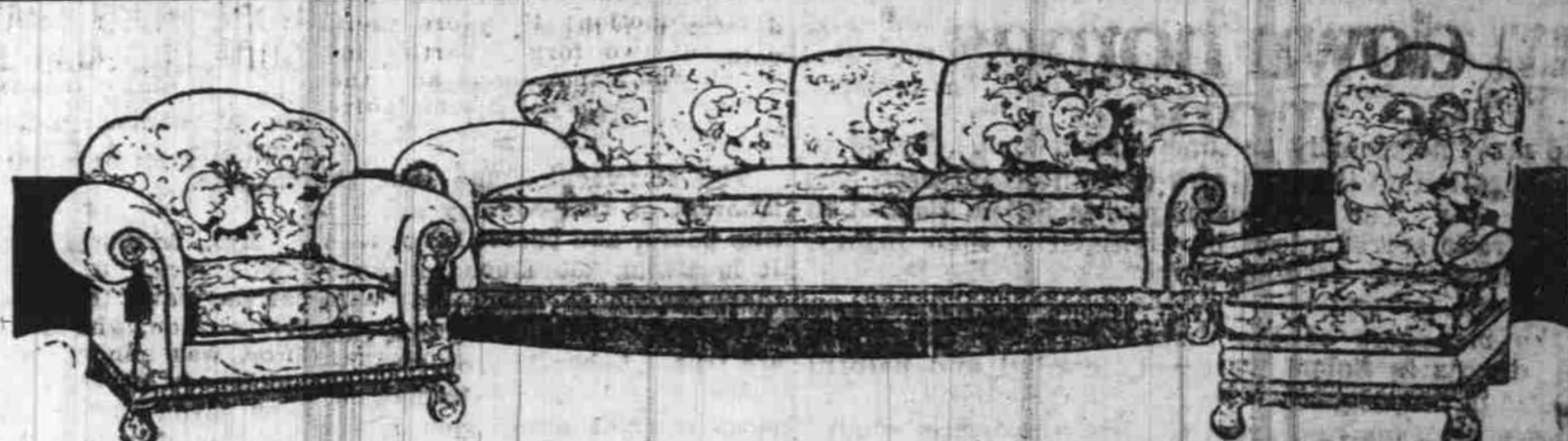
