Mr. Thompson was 48 years old and was popular in state house circles. He is survived by his mother Mrs. M. A. Thompson and a brother, Harry C. Thompson, a banker at Brownsville. Mr. Thompson was a member of the Salem Elks lodge and of Pacific lodge No. 50, A. F. & A. M. Funeral services will be held Friday at 2:30 from the Rigdon Mortuary with Rev. W. W. Long officiating and the Masonic and Elks lodges assisting. Interment will be in the IOOF cemetery.
