Outside Money Helps "During 1924 it is estimated by the state highway engineer that there will be 125,000 nonresident motor vehicles in the state of Oregon. Estimating three persons to each car and an average of five days and expenditure of five dollars per day, it will be seen that those who come into the state of Oregon by way of motor vehicles will spend practically \$10,-

000,000 in the state of Oregon in 1924. "It is my judgment that this estimate is low and that the net value of the tourit crop in Oregon in 1924 will be approximately \$5,-00.0,000.
