URGES SUGAR

Good Success With

While flax has been occupy-ing considerable public atten-tion, a number of people have been quietly investigating the sugar business with the result that already certain farmers are planning to plant sugar beets next year. According to demonstrations made here sugar beets with as high as 25 per cent sugar content can be produced in this valley, but for the war a sugar mill would have been in operation now. However let another man tell the story.

"Editor Statesman: "I am a resident of Marion county and have been for a number of years. In 1913 my farm was visited by some gen-tlemen from Salt Lake City who said they wanted to know something about the beet sugar business. I was led to be-lieve that a beet sugar mill would be in operation within a couple or three years. In the spring of 1914 I again ex-pressed my willingness to raise sugar beets but these gentlemen were not quite ready then. They promised to have their plans definitely by the first of September so that farmers could make their arrangements for the next year. Then the war came on and that ended the prospects of a sugar factory for the time being at any rate.

The war has been over now for six years and I again hear rumors of a sugar mill. My farm has raised sugar beets of 25 per cent content. I don't think I have raised any below
12 per cent. My land is no
better or no worse than my
neighbors. If the sugar mill
will come to Salem, I know
the farmers will be mighty glad to contribute all acreage for sugar beets that may be

required. "We are talking about diversity. Here's a chance to get away from our small num-ber of crops. The sugar beet industry is growing in many places and unless we start soon the territory will be occupied. I hope to be able to plant at least ten acres next spring. I hope the other farmers will do the same."

"Editor Statesman:

"After the Y. M. C. A. drive which of course must not be interferred with in any say, I am in favor of issuing bonds for a public auditorium. That will give us a lever on convens tions. I do not want this to interfere with the "Y" drive however as Salem must have that building, but I want to serve notice that an effort be made as soon as that drive is over to start the campaign for 329 Oregon Bldg. a municipal forum."
