## SECOND POLO MATCH TODAY

Both Americans and Britains Will Enter Tilt With Changed Lineup

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Battling against heavy odds Great Britain's poloists, with a shifted lineup will enter the second match of the international challenge cup series tomorrow at the Meadowbrook club, Westbury, in a determined attempt to check the Americans, who galloped to an overwhelming victory in the first game last Saturday.

The Americans are heavy favorites to win and thus retain possession of the historic trophy despite the fact that they will play without Malcolm Stevenson, crack No. 3, who suffered a slight concussion of the brain in a bad spill in the eight chukker of Saturday's match. Stevenson's place will be taken by Robert E. Strawbridge, Jr., of Philadelphia, who finished the first game at No. 3.

Although one more victory for the United States will settle the question of the polo supremacy between the two countries for another three years, the minimum interval provided for between series, a third contest will be played, regardless of the outcome of tomorrow's encounter. It will take place on Thursday, however, instead of Saturday as originally scheduled so that the tournament for the American open championship may get under way on the latter date.

## FOOTBALL SEASON LOOMS AT OREGON

Thirty Men, Including Two Veterans, Answer Maddock's First Call

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 15.—Thirty Oregon football men answered Coach Maddock's first call for fall practice at the University of Oregon this afternoon. The practice consisted mainly of passing, kicking and light limbering exercises to get the unused muscles of the athletes in shape.

Both Head Coach Maddock and Line Coach Spellman were far from pleased with the opening turnout, only two of the men turning out being veterans of the last year's varsity eleven—Terjesen, halfback and Mautz, end. The next two days will see the remainder of the regulars and other substitutes and ex-freshmen drifting in. Captain Reed did not report for the first workout but is expected soon.

The return of several of the promising football men is problematical and the real strength of the Oregon eleven will not be known until the last veteran has put in an appearance.

At present the football field is slow, having a new dressing of sand and sawdust, but it will be in excellent shape before the first home game with the Pacific team, October 11.
