WILLAMETTE U. STARTS OFF WELL

Acting President Alden Delivers Strong Address Pleading for Loyalty

In his address of welcome yesterday before one of the largest student bodies that has assembled for the first chapel in many years, Dean George A. Alden said that "one of the things that gives Willamette University its present standing is the high entrance requirements. We have the highest entrance requirements of any college in the Northwest. And with the stiffening of the classroom work of this year it will be as hard to get out of Willamette as it is to get in. But that makes the school."

Before the chapel was called to order, the organist began to play through various airs and as the chords of "I Love Willamette U" sounded forth the melody arose in spontaneous outburst from several hundred throats in a paean of praise. An impressive hush followed the close of this school song, and then the majestic strains of "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts" were heard from the organ and the chapel audience arose to join reverently in the hymn.

The first words of the chapel service were those from Dean Alden as he said, "Especially at the beginning of the school year, we should look to God" and then he read that inspiring chapter of all time, the 13th of First Corinthians.

Dr. J. D. McCormick of Kimball School of Theology led in a prayer of supplication and then the dean arose again to give the opening address. The sophomore class of this year has presented the plan of a new policy toward Freshmen. Dean Alden said, and for which he was very grateful. All modern institutions of learning were abolishing this form of antiquity, said the dean, as was shown in a recent meeting of the Deans of the Pacific coast which he attended. From Mexico to Canada there are now only two colleges that countenance hazing, and one of them is Willamette. "The fly in the ointment" of the spirit of Willamette is this matter of "hazing"

and although he hoped that some less forceful means could be found than the use of the mill-race, yet the Dean said that he advised all Freshmen to wear their green caps, one of the traditions of the school that will never die. High moral and high scholastic standing are the two things that uphold Willamette's place among institutions of learning. With apologies to the faculty, Dean Alden said that he felt he must give first place in the factors of Willamette's high standing, to the student body itself. Said the dean, "There are those who feel that the school's attitude toward dancing and cigarette smoking is old-fashioned, but I feel that it is one of the institution's strongest assets. Let those who want dancing and cigarettes go elsewhere to get them."

The outlook for the year in athletics is very promising, said the speaker, and although victories are mighty fine to win, yet the primary purpose of the athletic program was to play clean games. A clean game upon the field, in the classroom or wherever one might find oneself, should be a guiding ambition of life.

"We of the faculty pledge ourselves to make this the best year of your life," said the acting head of Willamette in closing.

Among the announcements that followed the address of Dean Alden, was that of the Y-W-YM reception to take place tonight at 8 o'clock at the First Methodist church. This is a big "get-together" meeting for all the student body and one of the finest events of the college year.

FIRPO TESTIFIES IN COURT TODAY

Argentine Fighter to Appear in His Own Defense on Perjury Charge

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine boxer, will testify in his own defense tomorrow at the hearing before Immigration Inspector W. W. Brown on the Rev. William S. Chase's charges that Firpo made false statements on entering the United States several weeks ago. Inspector Brown's official report on the hearing probably will be sent to Washington next Monday, officials said.

Seven witnesses were examined in the four-hour hearing today. These included the Landlady and two tenants of the apartment house in which Canon Chase asserts the boxer and Blanca Lourdes Peart lived while Firpo was training last year for his bout with Dempsey. Two other witnesses were employees of the liner, American Legion, when Firpo and Miss Lourdes arrived here on the steamer this year.

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SHORT CANNERY PACK INDICATED

Prunes and Pears Not to Be Plentiful, Says Letter From Paulus

Indications of a short cannery pack of prunes and a corresponding short pack of pears is indicated in a letter to the trade by the Robert C. Paulus company, of Salem. Berry stocks are also being thinned out, the letter says. The letter, in part, is as follows: "The Bartlett pear canning season is just about over except for the pears which are being held in cold storage and are being ripened slowly. Nearly every canner is going to be obliged to deliver short on seconds and standards, and quite a number will also deliver short on choice and fancy. There were a few lots of choice and fancy pears left unsold in the hands of some canners who did not sell early on account of not knowing what they were going to have to pack. These lots have been snapped up as fast as they have been quoted. Two or three small canners advise us they will have a few hundred cases of pears each when they finish packing, and this is the extent of the surplus of pears in the northwest as far as we can find it.

"The last two weeks has also seen an additional thinning out of the stocks of cherries and loganberries. Buyers are also beginning to clean up the remaining gooseberries, and red raspberries. "The pack of canned fresh prunes is going to be short. A lot of the larger canners who canned

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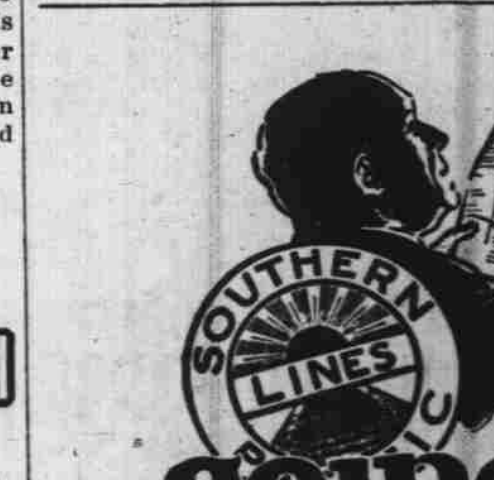
