Steady Increase Seen In Argentine Population

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 20 (AP)—Countries with a high birth rate have a high death rate, but there is one exception in the world and that is Argentina, according to Alejandro E. Bunge, economist and government statistician.

In 30 years, Mr. Bunge says, Argentina's death rate has dropped from 25 a thousand to 13.6 a thousand, one of the lowest in the world, while a birth rate of 33 a thousand has been maintained. These two facts combined produce a natural increase in population. The mortality of infants before reaching one year of age is only 10 per cent in Argentina, compared with rates of from 9 to 25 per cent in other countries.
