DOPESTERS GET BUSY

Odds are About Even Between Washington Senators and N. Y. Giants

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Washington's sensational victory in the American league has stirred baseball fanism to unprecedented enthusiasm in the fight which the Senators will start for the world's championship with the New York Giants next Saturday in the national capital.

Officials of each club after a long conference today with commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis, disclosed that they are being flooded with requests for reservations from all parts of the country. The commissioner who conferred with President Charles A. Stoneham of the Giants and Secretary E. B. Eynon, Jr., of the Senators to perfect arrangements for the series also averred his opinion that "unparalleled interest is being shown."

Huge crowds expected. Only the fact that Washington's American league park is unable to match the capacity of the Yankee stadium will prevent the shattering of the records for attendance and receipts established in the million dollar series of 1923, officials declared.

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HOT WORLD'S SERIES LOOMS

Battle Will Be Between Age and Experience and Youth and Fire

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The world's baseball series between New York and Washington promises many spectacular features and not the least of these will be the battle of strategy between John J. McGraw, veteran leader of the Giants, and Stanley Harris, youthful playing manager of the American league champions.

McGraw, known as the "master mind" and the "little Napoleon" will match the experience that has carried him to ten pennants in the past twenty years, four of them in a row, against the fiery leadership of "Bucky" Harris, youngest of all pennant winning pilots inspired by triumph in his first year at the helm.

Last Year McGraw was beaten in a struggle heralded as a test between his master mind and "brute force" as typified by Babe Ruth and the slugging Yankees. This year "ambitious youth" will try to outwit the "master mind."

Harris, who will not be 28 until November 8, has had only five years major league experience. McGraw has led the Giants into the fray since 1902. He was a playing star on the famous Baltimore Orioles in the 90's, before Harris was born at Port Jervis, N. Y., in 1896.

McGraw directs his athletes from the bench. He is credited with deciding every pitch his twirlers throw and with directing all moves on the attack. Harris leads his men from a post in the thick of the fray.

Ability to inspire aggressiveness is a characteristic shared by both managers. McGraw's clubs have always been known for their fighting qualities, particularly under fire, while Harris has had his men battling with unquenchable spirit throughout one of the hottest campaigns in history.

Harris Works Wonders. Harris, who was bought from the Buffalo club in 1919 at a reported price of only \$4,000, is a reliable fielder and dependable batter. His chief assets, however, have not been his playing ability but the manner in which he has worked wonder with a supposedly mediocre team.

He succeeded Bonie Bush at the start of the season, his selection being made at the eleventh hour by Clark Griffith, and turned a pennant winner out of virtually the same material that just managed to get out of the second division in the closing part of last season. Harris shares the fruits of victory with his great pitcher, Walter Johnson, who played a major part in the triumph with one of the best seasons of his long career, but the fighting spirit that the young manager instilled into his club was probably the most decisive factor.

Harris broke into baseball with the Pittston, Penn., club in 1915. He went to Detroit at the opening of the next season and closed the year at Scranton, Penn. The Muskogee, Mich., Norfolk, Va., and Buffalo clubs then claimed his services before he came to Washington.

BEARCATS ARE MUCH BATTERED

Rathbun to Use No Scrimmage Prior to Game With Washington

Battered and bruised as a result of their valiant stand against the University of Oregon football machine last Saturday, the Bearcats are being given an opportunity to recuperate this week for one of the hard games of the season is to be played in Seattle Saturday against the University of Washington. Having no hope of a win or even close break with the Purple and Gold, Coach Guy L. Rathbun, with nothing to gain and everything to lose should a few of his proteges be injured, is confining work this week to correcting weak places which appeared in the line-up last week. There will be no scrimmage prior to the Willamette players, about 20 strong, leaving for the north Friday.

Faults which loomed up in the opening game of the season included a weakness on handling punts and considerable fumbling, for which there were no reasons for either team, for the field was not muddy. Only four plays were used against the Lemon-Yellow warriors Saturday. Five of the linemen were playing their second season. Others were great at the business, yet the Bearcats fought Oregon to a scoreless tie.

Hemphill, an end, is out of the game this week and off the campus, having been called to Berkeley, Cal., by the illness of his mother. Hemphill also has a bad ankle and will be missed in the game this week. Hartley and Faschnacht both have tackle shoulders, received in the Oregon game. Waite, the big husky but green player, has a bad knee. With games that mean much to Willamette, yet to be played, Coach Rathbun will send his men against the Purple and Gold Saturday with the expectation of an overwhelming defeat and take no chance of further crippling his men. Last year the University of Washington defeated the Bearcats 54 to 0.

GONZAGA PREPARES FOR IDAHO GAME

Only Four Veterans Left From Last Year's Team; Is Claim Made

INTERNATIONAL RACES PLANNED

\$200,000 Purse to Be Offered—Foreign Invaders Invited to Run

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Plans for a series of four international horse races in 1925, two to be run in Kentucky and two in New York, have been laid before August Belmont, chairman of the Jockey club, by Matt J. Winn, general manager of the Kentucky Jockey club.

Mr. Winn disclosed that the proposal involves an aggregate purse of \$200,000 for the series for which the best of Europe's thoroughbreds would be invited to compete with American horses.

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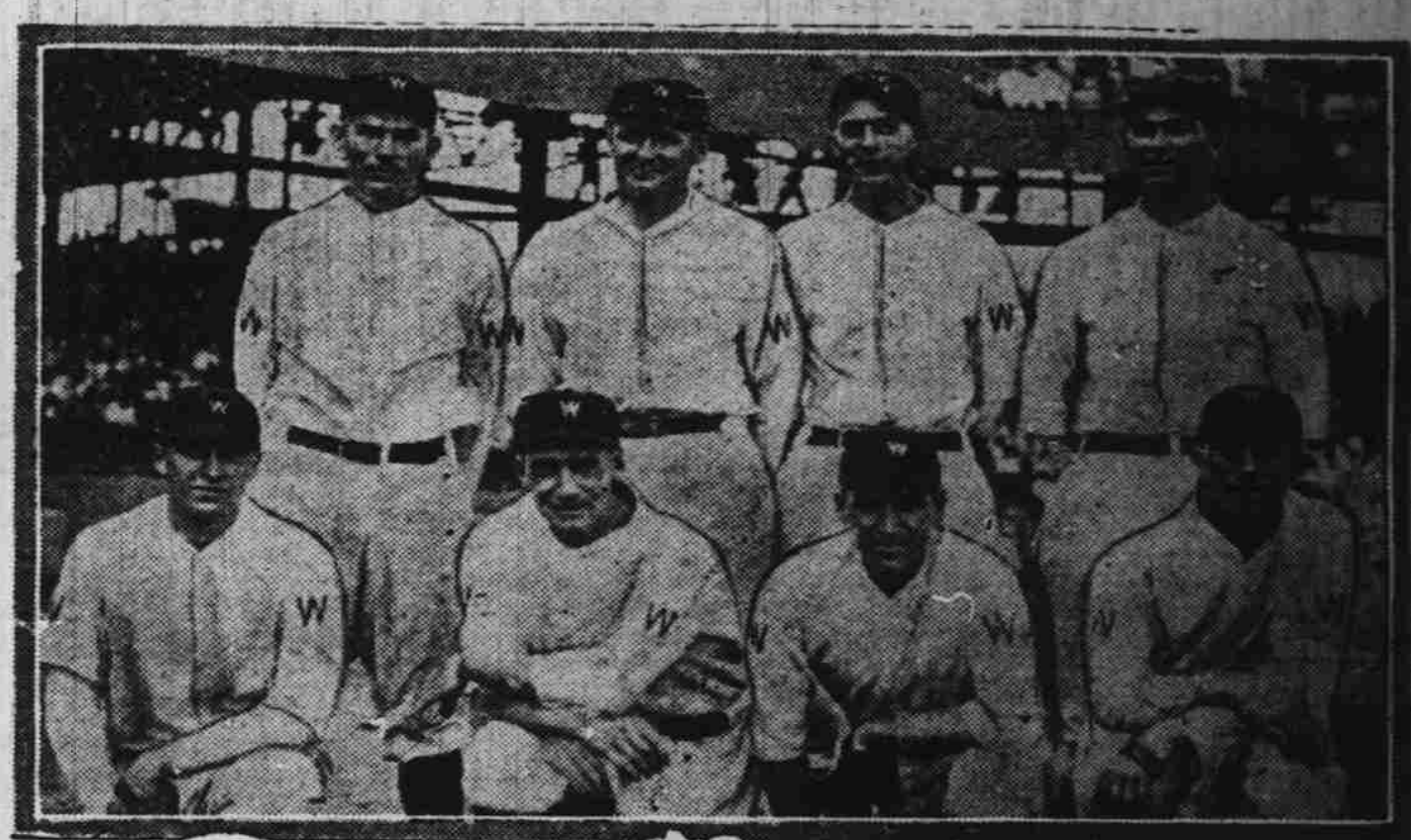
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PITCHING STAFF THAT HELPED WIN AMERICAN PENNANT FOR SENATORS

RAIN QUENCHES SPORTS AT N. Y.

Fatal Knockout Blow Is Dealt All Open Air Sporting Activities

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Rain today dealt a knockout blow to sporting activities. Baseball, boxing, cricket, polo and horse racing programs all were shelved because of a heavy downpour.

In Philadelphia the dethroned baseball champions, the New York Yankees, were forced to cancel a doubleheader with the Athletics, which was to have marked the season's close. The international cricket matches were halted and the welterweight title bout between Mickey Walker, the American champion, and Bobby Barrett, was postponed until tomorrow night.

Semi-finals in the Monty Waterbury cup polo tournament at Westbury were called off, and because of the soggy condition of field cannot be played before Thursday.

Boxing in Cleveland, grand circuit harness racing in Columbus, and exhibition baseball games involving major league clubs, were called off in Baltimore and New Haven.
