accompaniments is popularly known in Salem musical circles. A pupil of Miss Beatrice Shelton, she has been accompanist for the Apollo club for a number of seasons.

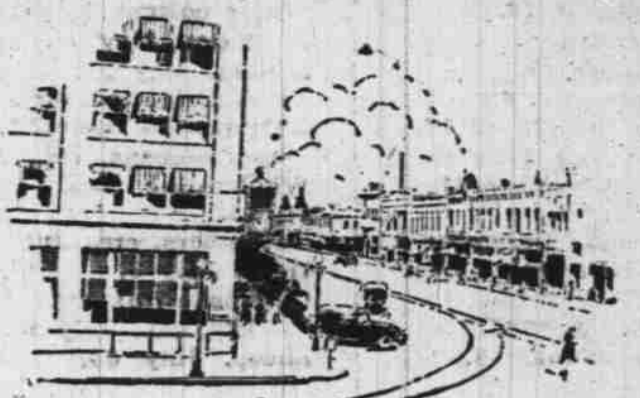
The Golden Hour club will meet for a 1 o'clock luncheon today at the home of Mrs. D. N. Hendricks. This is the first meeting
