REPUBLICANS IN COLLEGE ACTIVE

Club Organized at Willamette to Make Close Study of All Issues

Preliminary steps were made last week for the installation of a republican club among the students of Willamette university. This club will be associated with the republican national committee through John Hamlin, director of the college bureau, according to Eugene F. Short, representative of the college bureau.

The nation-wide republican club movement was started last year when the national committee established a department for educational work among the colleges. The clubs are organized on a permanent basis with a constitution and executive committee of students and are modeled after the older republican clubs of the eastern colleges.

Merle Bonney is acting chairman of the newly organized club and is supported by an executive committee made up of republican students in the university. Plans are outlined by the committee for a strong advisory board of republican men and arrangements are being made for cooperating with the state republican committee through County Chairman Paul F. Burris of Salem.

In organizing a general program for the republican clubs in the western colleges for this fall which calls for the installation of more than 30 college clubs, Short said:

"The republican club of Willamette university is organized for serious study of current conditions, party planks and ideals. Students will have an opportunity to hear speakers of state and national importance through the efforts of the state committee and the county chairman. The permanent work of the club will carry its activities throughout the year. A better understanding of things political and the workings of our governmental system will be had because of the club."

"The movement has aroused widespread interest and to date

over 200 colleges have organized clubs. Last year clubs were organized at the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college, as well as in all the state colleges of the coast states. Plans for fall work of these clubs, feature speakers, banqueting and speaking contests, as well as assistance from the students in the fall campaign."

Joe Nee of Willamette will sing Scotch songs and a male quartet will be heard. The convention will be open to any who wish to attend.

The second team under assistant Coach Sparks is becoming a hard chopping block for the varsity. Winslow and the two Zeller brothers of the freshman show signs of future varsity strength, as does also Nakano, a second year man.

The outstanding change, however is in the varsity backfield. Tackles behind the line are few and far between and fumbles are almost eliminated.

GIANTS AVERAGE REMAINS HIGHER

New Yorkers Still Rank Above Senators in Batting and Fielding

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—New York remained in the lead in team batting and fielding in the world series although Washington won today's game and evened the count. As a club the Giants are batting .279 and the Senators .250. Terry, Giant first baseman leads his team mates with a percentage of .500 and Nehf, star southpaw pitcher, is second with .429. Lindstrom, rookie third baseman has batted at a .360 clip in the series. Frisch and Kelly are each hitting .320 and Gowdy and Bentley, with percentages of .286, are next in line.

There are two 400 hitters in the Washington lineup. Peckinpah with .417 and Judge with .409.

Goslin has a percentage of .333 for the six games, Harris .268, Rice .250 and McNeely .238.

The Giants have made four errors, making their team fielding average .988, while eight errors by the Senators brings them down to .969. Only two runs separate the team totals, the Giants having scored 24 and Washington 22. New York has made 58 hits for a total of 80 bases; Washington 51 for 68.
