Two Obtain Licenses— Names of two Salem people have appeared in the Portland papers as having obtained marriage licenses. Russell S. Scott, of 436 Water, and Pearl Wolcott, of Portland, received Multnomah county licenses while Rose M. Landis, 18, of Salem and Delta Culp, 23, of Amity, received a license at Vancouver, Wash.

Many Seek Work— Two hundred and nine men and women called for work at the United States employment bureau at the YMCA during the week ending at noon October 11, according to the report of Sim Phillips. Of this number 107 were in demand, 96 referred and 85 placed. Common labor headed the list for the men, with 94 registrants, 40 in demand, referred and 39 placed. There were 46 agricultural workers calling, demand for 33 and 28 placed. Eight of the 14 farm hands found work while three of the 10 woods laborers were placed. Fifty per cent of the 13 carpenters were able to find work. There were no calls for the two truck drivers or

one engineer who registered. Fifteen women registered for cooking jobs, with demand for six, who were placed. Four of the seven housekeepers found work while there was no demand for the eight agricultural workers who registered.
