WOOSTROFF WINS AAU PENTATHLON

Newark Athletic Club Man Takes First Place in National Event

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Anthony Woostroff of the Newark AC today won the national AAU pentathlon championship, held under the auspices of the New York AC, at Travers Island. Woostroff won the broad jump, javelin throw, 200 meter dash and 1500 meter run and finished third in the discus throw for his winning total of 17 points. Bob Legendre of the Newark AC who broke the world's broad jump record in the Olympics, did not defend his title.

Charles Ashton of the New York AC was second with 15 points, winning the discus and being placed third in three events and fifth in the other.

MAY CALL OFF OAC-USC GAME

Managers Disagree Over Question of Removing Sawdust From Field

Serious possibility was seen last night that the game scheduled between the University of Southern California and Oregon agricultural college next Saturday at Portland might be called off.

According to word received from Corvallis, a disagreement has arisen between graduate manager Lodell of OAC, and Gwynn Wilson, graduate manager for the Trojans, over the question of removing the sawdust from Multnomah field. A wire was received from Wilson demanding that the saw dust be removed, as apparently the Southern California graders were not accustomed to playing on that kind of a field. The authorities at Corvallis refused to comply with the demand, giving as their reason that the establishment of a precedent of that kind would be undesirable. The OAC field is a sawdust field.

Unless some agreement can be reached between the authorities of the two colleges the game will not be played.

LOS ANGELES CLUB STAGES COMEBACK

Team Rises From Bottom Place to One Notch Under League Leaders

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—The rise of Los Angeles from the cellar position in the Pacific coast league to second place, a mere half game being the leading Seattle club, and a game ahead of San Francisco, which team held the lead virtually all season is one of the most sensational spurts in the annals of Coast league baseball.

Beginning with the series of August 5 the Angels played phenomenally consistent baseball and battled their way victoriously through every series but one, losing to Oakland the week of September 15. In the remarkable clash Manager Marty Krugled led the team to victory over San Francisco, Sacramento, Salt Lake and Portland in two series each, and Seattle in one, and lost one to Oakland by a four to three margin, totaling fifty victories and but twenty-one defeats. Six of the ten series were played away from their home grounds.

Portland offered no resistance whatever to the flight of the Angels, being shut out in both series, 7 to 0 in the series of September 23 and 5 to 0 in last week's abbreviated set.

Los Angeles finishes the season at home with Vernon as its opponent.

CONFESSED SLAYER GRINS AT EVIDENCE

Warren-Lincoln Only Smiles When Witnesses Testify to His Sanity

GENEVA, Ill., Oct. 13.—Warren J. Lincoln, lawyer and confessed murderer, whose mental condition is to be passed upon by a jury, listened today with a smiling face to witness after witness testifying that he was sane.

Police officers, alienists and lay witnesses who included Mayor Charles H. Green of Aurora, were among those who testified that in their opinion the man who slew his wife and her brother and sealed their heads in a block of concrete was a rational person with a full recognition of the difference between right and wrong. When he was characterized by alienists as a shrewd and fakir Lincoln stroked his chin thoughtfully, pursing his lips. At no time did he show the perturbation or anger that marked his demeanor Friday when Dr. Harry S. Hulbert, the Leopold-Loeb trial alienist, said that it was a certainty he is an insane person.

QUINLAND AND SHERMAN BACK

Runaway Boy and Convict Returned to Salem By Lad's Father

A desire to see the world led Eldon Quinland, 14, son of John Quinland, chief engineer at the state prison, to run away with "Pee-Wee" Sherman, convict, the lad said Sunday upon reaching home in charge of his father who was sent east for the missing pair.

Young Quinland and Sherman disappeared here over a month ago, the lad leaving his clothing and bicycle on the bank of the river giving the impression that he had been drowned. Quinland and Sherman were picked up and jailed for vagrancy in Boone, Ia. They were on their way to Elgin, Ill. to see Sherman's father, they said.

The two said they went direct to Astoria after leaving Salem. From that place they took a lumber schooner to San Francisco, later beating their way east through Green River and Denver. When they were arrested at Boone both denied being wanted. Even after photographs had been produced they continued their stand. Sherman was the first to break down and admit their identity.

Sherman was received from Clatsop county on two charges, five years for larceny and two years for forgery. After serving a portion of the first sentence he was paroled. This parole has been revoked. Warden A. M. Dalrymple said, and Sherman has four and one-half years yet to serve. At present there is no prosecution planned, though under the law he can be sentenced to 10 years for escaping. Prosecution can be instigated anytime and may be ordered.

Neither of the pair appeared any the worse for their experience. Sherman is 25 years old, weighs about 115 pounds and is said to be an ex-jockey.

Harry Greb Draws With Philadelphian

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 13.—Harry Greb of Pittsburgh, mid-

dweight champion of the world, and Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia, fought 10 rounds tonight to a draw, the decision being given by the referee after the two judges had disagreed. The weight of each man was announced as 168 pounds.

Both men tried hard for a knockout, but they appeared to lack the necessary punching power. Greb's title was not at stake.
