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TOM SKEYHILL TO LECTURE IN SALEM

Will Be Under Auspices of War Mothers for the Soldier Monument Fund

Tom Skeyhill, Australian soldier-lecturer, traveler, has spoken in every state in the United States and every province in Canada during the past five years, and has addressed important gatherings in his native Australia, New Zealand and England. He will give his lecture, "The New Renaissance in Europe," on the evening of December 4 at the armory.



Theodore Roosevelt said of this young orator: "I would rather be on the platform with Tom Skeyhill than any man I know." The Literary Digest said of him: "He's the sort of man worth reading about," and the New York Globe said: "Skeyhill is the most inspiring speaker that has ever appeared at the Metropolitan Opera house," when he talked for one of the war drives and raised \$23,000,000 at the rate of about a million a minute.

Previous to those war speeches he had served as an "Anzac," been blinded by shell explosion, and lived in darkness for two years. Since that time he has visited Soviet Russia and talked with leaders new and old, and again in the fall of 1922 journeyed to Europe to learn first-hand the conditions of affairs there. The lecture of Mr. Skeyhill in Salem will be under the auspices of the Salem chapter of the American War Mothers, the proceeds to go to the soldier monument fund.

THREE OF GIANTS ARE EXONERATED

Frisch, Kelly and Young Relieved of Scandal By Judge Landis

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Frank Frisch, George Kelly and Ross Young, New York Giant players, implicated by Jimmy O'Connell in the latter's attempted bribery of Heinie Sand, Philadelphia shortstop, were exonerated of all connection with the scandal by Commissioner Landis because O'Connell's story did not jibe with the circumstances at the time of his action.

Asked by Landis what he did after offering Sand \$500 to "throw" the game, O'Connell was said to have related that he walked to the batting cage and there told Kelly what had happened. Then, O'Connell said, he took part in batting practice.

According to Sand, however, O'Connell did not approach any other player at once but went to the bench and sat alone in one corner.

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AGGIES ARE RARIN' FOR GAME SATURDAY

Men All in Good Shape for Battle With Southern California Team

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 15.—(Special).—"Go get 'em Aggies" is the cry of OAC fans who, along with the team and coach, have turned their undivided attention toward the first coast conference struggle with the University of Southern California on Multnomah field Saturday.

While the slender margin of victory the Aggies had over the Multnomah club last Saturday was a disappointment to some of the over enthusiastic fans here, veteran critics who saw the game say the showing of the team and the outcome was the best possible to insure a victory or close game next Saturday.

Although there was a notable lack of speed and consistent team work shown by the Aggies, the fact that they were playing against a lineup of veteran all-stars and were limited to straight football and short passes by the coach, must be mentioned in their favor. A similar situation brought a tie game between Stanford and the Olympic club of San Francisco the same day.

That Coach Paul Schissler has a real quarterback in Ray Price was again demonstrated when Price consistently succeeded in getting away from such ends as Murphy and Allison for long returns of punts. This ability, together with Tebb's punting, enabled the Aggies to gain from 10 to 20 yards on nearly every exchange of kicks with the clubbers, and is counted on to be an important factor in the result Saturday.

No injuries of consequence resulted from the game with the clubbers, and barring unforeseen mishaps, the squad from here should number not less than 30 men in good shape for the crucial test of strength at Portland Saturday.
