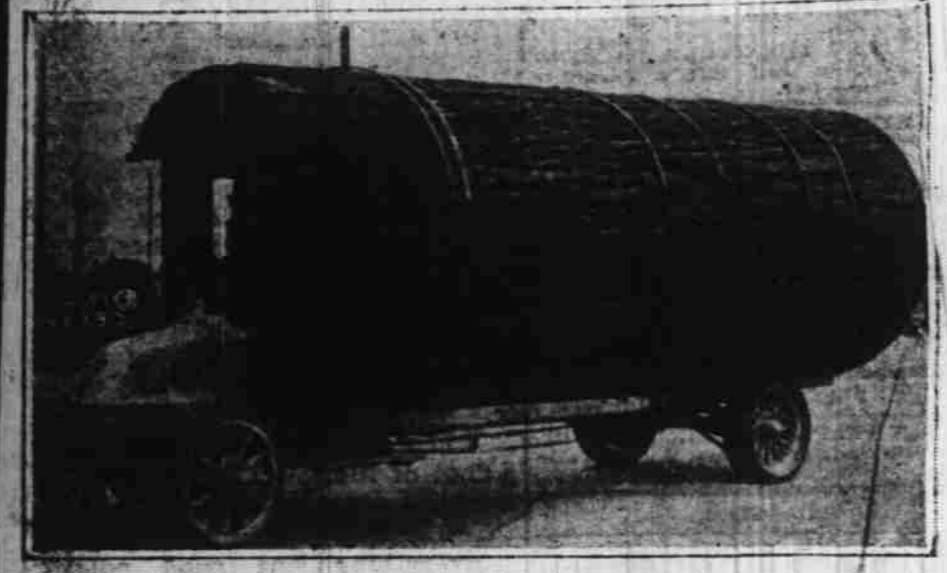


GIANT LOG USED BY MAN AS HOME

Truck Utilized to Transport Curiosity on Tour of Country

A huge Douglas fir log has been converted into a modern home, mounted upon a truck and is on display at State and Liberty by C. E. Case, the owner.



The log measures 22 feet in length and eight feet in diameter. It is hollowed out and every modern home convenience installed. There is a kitchenette, a breakfast nook and bath-room, with showers, a library, and furniture that makes a home complete. A water system has been installed, the pressure being obtained from a 25 gallon water tank underneath the truck. Mr. Case, in commenting upon his unique home, said that the age of the log was estimated at 2100 years. At that estimate the tree, from which this log was cut, must have been growing 176 years before the time of Christ, and was 1683 years old when Jamestown was first settled.

The log was cut from the butt end 44 feet from the ground and measured eight feet in diameter where it measured seven feet and seven inches in diameter. Actual measurements showed that the tree was 14 feet in diameter at the base, 275 to 300 feet in height and was 64 feet from the top where it measured seven feet and seven inches in diameter.

Thirteen months were consumed in the construction of the home, and its estimated value is \$6,000 above the actual cost of the truck. A six months' hunt in the forest was necessary before Case discovered the tree from which he cut his home. Expert lumbermen and scalers said that it was the most perfectly formed tree that had been cut from the Pacific northwest forest.

The unique home will be on display today, tonight and possibly tomorrow night.

Payne was fined \$2.50 for an open cut-out, and Glen Miller was fined \$1 for driving without light.

UNIFORM FLAG PLAN APPROVED

City Council Will Permit VFW to Place Housings in Business District

By unanimous vote last night the city council granted permission to the Veterans of Foreign Wars to place housings in the business districts, which will allow the display of the American flag from in front of the business places. Other Willamette valley cities have the same arrangements by which the streets are uniformly decorated with flags. The housings are of metal and are to be placed flush with the surface of the sidewalk, 18 inches from the outer sidewalk line, and are to be regularly spaced.

An ordinance regulating the construction of filling stations was passed and a measure modifying the sidewalk line on the north side of Lincoln, between Fairmount and High streets, was also acted upon. A bill for defining the term "peddler," prohibiting peddling without a license in Salem, and at the same time providing for a penalty for the violation was read for the second time.

A vast quantity of routine business was handled. This consisted chiefly of granting petitions for street improvements, sewer improvements and other matters. A petition of the school board of District 24 for a fire hydrant at the intersection of Capitol and D streets was heard. Petitions were accepted concerning the construction of a sewer from Oak to Shelton. A remonstrance against the proposed improvement of Wilber from Commercial to Riverside streets was accepted.

Direct publication of notice of assessment for the cost of improving South Twenty-first from State to the Turner road was authorized. Other matters under this head directed the city engineer to serve notice on E. Marion Kightlinger to remove an old barn in Jones' addition.

Discussion was centered around the improvement of the Union street sewer, which was said to have been a nuisance to the residents. This matter was cleared away when it was announced that the materials had been ordered to repair the defective sewer.

The citizens' budget committee will meet with the city council in special session Friday night at 7:30 o'clock.

P. H. D'Arcy Celebrates Sixty-fifth Anniversary of His Arrival in City

Original resident of Lot 1, Block 1 and Ward 1 sings pioneer ditty before Chamber of Commerce. Came from Portland on October 20, 1859.

JUDGE P. H. D'ARCY, who claims Lot 1, Block 1 and Ward 1 as his residence for the last 65 years, yesterday celebrated his arrival in the city on October 20, 1859, by appearing before the Chamber of Commerce forum with a short talk on reminiscences. By way of showing that in spirit he is as young as he was in the old days, Judge D'Arcy sang several verses of a favorite pioneer melody, "Sweet Betsy from Pike." These were heartily received.

Sixty-five years ago Monday the youthful Peter D'Arcy arrived in Salem in a downpour. The trip was made by stage, he said, and it was necessary to change horses at Oregon City, Aurora and Brooks. The stage was due here about 3 o'clock but it was after 7 o'clock before it arrived.

One of his earliest recollections of Salem was the July 4 address of Col. E. D. Baker, who was elected to the United States senate after living here but seven months. The address lasted for two hours and was given from beneath a large tree that stood in a vacant lot, the present location of the Giese-Powers Furniture company on Court.

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MEMBER PIONEER FAMILY PASSES

Mrs. Roscoe E. Moores, Born in Salem and Resident Here All Her Life

After a long illness, Mrs. Ross E. Moores died at the family home, 517 North Front street, twenty minutes to seven last evening, Monday, Oct. 20, 1924.

She was born in Salem of pioneer parents October 6, 1868, and spent all her life in this city. Her father, A. L. Stinson, at one time did the printing for the state of Oregon, and the Stinson printing office finally became The Statesman job office, some of the type frames he used still being in service.

Her maiden name was Mary Stinson, and she was a member of the Rebekahs and of the Silver Bell Circle of Pythian Sisters.

Besides her husband, Ross E. Moores, the printer, at 122 North Commercial street, she leaves a nephew, Logan Stinson of Marshfield; Mrs. C. F. Williams, a niece, Portland, and a nephew, Aisa Prettyman, in California.

The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow at the late residence, and the interment will be in the IOOF cemetery.
