

IDAHO VANDALS DEFEAT OREGON AGGIES TO THE TUNE OF 22-0

AERIAL PLAY IS FEATURED

BELL FIELD, Corvallis, Oct. 31.—On a rain-soaked field the University of Idaho's football eleven overwhelmed the Oregon Aggies 22 to 0 before a crowd estimated at 12,000. Idaho played an aggressive game, depending almost entirely upon forward passes to gain needed yardage. Very little straight football was displayed.

Idaho started the scoring early in the first period when Vesser went across the Aggie goal line to receive a pass from Stivers, Idaho quarterback. A few minutes later, Cameron scored another touchdown after taking a pass from Stivers out of the air. The third touchdown came in the second period after a series of long passes brought the ball to the Aggie four-yard line, and a short pass, Stivers to Vesser, put it across.

Shortly before the game ended Stivers made a place kick from the Aggie 17-yard line after Idaho had recovered an Aggie fumble on the Aggies' 35-yard line and with a long pass put the ball within kicking distance. The Aggies threatened the Idaho goal late in the second period. Taking the ball on their own 34-yard line by intercepting a pass, they completed four long passes and advanced to Idaho's 20-yard line just as the half ended.

Before the game OAC dedicated the new stands on Bell field.
