TWO TEAMS TO OPEN SCHEDULE

Legion Meets Guard and Union Oil Will Clash With U. S. Bank Quintette

TALE OF TUT'S TOMB TELLS INTERESTING

Place Visited By Mother Fifty Years Ago Is Recognized at Once

While I have lived in the Waldo Hills all my life, I have never spent much time in the Santiam country. I only saw King Tut's tomb last week when I made a special trip because of what I had read in the newspapers. I recognized it at once as the "very structure my mother had described fifty years previously. She got the story from an old Indian and I think it accounts as reasonably as anything else for alleged tomb and the alleged blood that is said to be in the crevices. Couched in my own language this old Indian story was this:

"Many many moons ago after our people had been outraged and our young men killed by the pale faces, we made a raid and captured among others a white woman. In a short time she gave birth to twin girls. Thinking perhaps she was closer to the gods that the average woman, we respected her and cared for her gently. The twin girls grew to beautiful womanhood the envy of every young man of the tribe but the particular care of all the old chiefs.

"Finally one day after a great battle in which the Indians were successful, many white men having perished, the young men came back to their campground and the son of the first chieftain demanded the twins as a result of his gallantry and bravery. They overheard the conversation and sought to run away. The other young men of the tribe suspecting what was going on in the tent started in pursuit. The twins ran until exhausted when they fell upon a rock. Then a wonderful thing happened. The rock began to grow like a toadstool, big and broad, and the twins kept out of the reach of the young braves. They saw the spectacle and held back in wonder.

"The young chief having gained the consent of his father came out to hunt the twins and saw what was going on. He immediately started to climb the huge boulder. Finding a loose rock one of the twin girls picked it up, hit the young chief on the head and he fell down, bleeding in every pore. The old chief heard what had happened to his son, his heir, and although his heart was sick because of what he had promised,

he said that his son's death must be avenged. Our young men were ordered to climb the rock and fetch the girls to be punished by the big chief. The girls' position was advantageous and they managed to hurl back all the young men as fast as they came. Many fell to the ground lifeless, others fell part way and hung in crags and crevices sorely wounded and bleeding profusely.

Finally trees were felled, a huge fire was built up all around the boulder and the twins perished miserably on the top of the rock. Ever since that time there has been blood in the crevices of the rock and the crevices were filled up by the heat that partially melted the rock. There has always been a superstition connected with this rock and this is a true story of how it was formed and why."

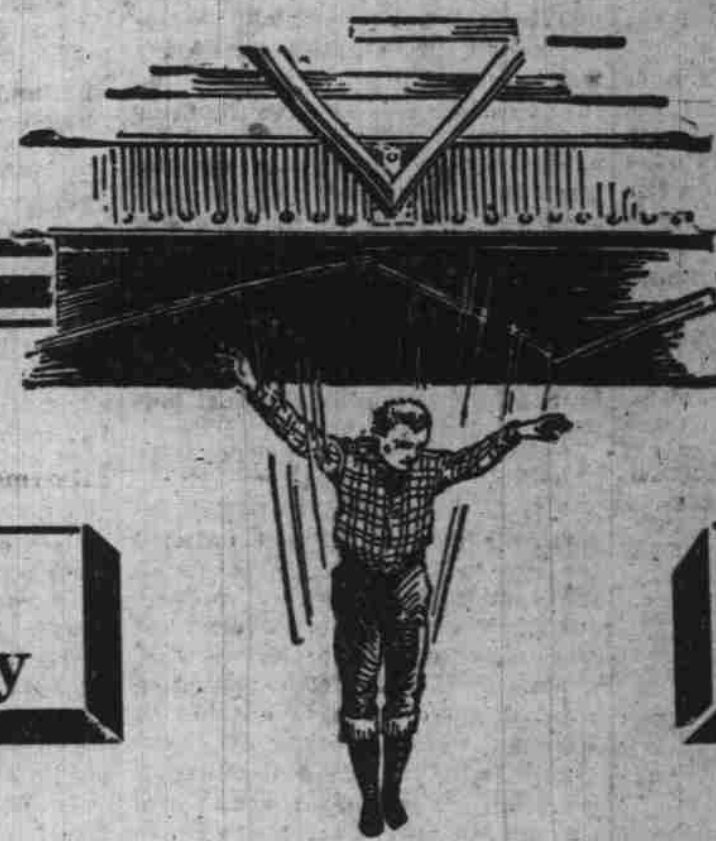
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
