ELLA McMUNN Philosopher

BY VERA BRADY SHIPMAN I had read from time to time in The Statesman, before I came to Salem, articles by Ella McMunn. Her humor was always kindly, her faith in humanity so evident that early in my Salem visit I asked to meet her. I was told by one who prizes her friendship as golden, that she had suffered an accident some time ago and for some years had not left her home farm. Yet her occasional contributions to The Statesman have kept her in touch with the world, or rather the world in touch with her. But why does she not turn her efforts to further writing? The writer with physical handicap, frequently turns out greater concentrated genius in writing than the more fortunate sister in perfect health. I was eager to meet this little woman whose kindly pen was dipped in love for others. Surely she must write more. And one day the opportunity unexpectedly came to me. It was the day that Mr. Bligh was killed in a motor accident. The office staff felt inadequate in writing an obituary of this man whose work had been city building. Some one suggested "why not ask Ella McMunn to write a tribute to Mr. Bligh? She knew his fine work and SHE can say what we should like to say." After an afternoon of phoning, a kindly neighbor delivered our message and at 6 o'clock in the evening, in a pouring rain (as Oregon CAN pour) we drove out to her farm a mile or so off the highway. Here, we met a quaint little woman whose bright eyes and a wealth of dark hair bound low at her neck completed the picture of the old fashioned room. "Come in boys and girls," she said to the editor of The Statesman, his wife and daughter, and softly added: "come on in an talk a bit." And we did joyfully talk a bit. Woman Chosen For The Official Job

SEATTLE, Nov. 6.—Mrs. Samuel G. Cosgrove, widow of Washington's former governor, is to be chosen for the first time in the history of Washington to take the state's seven electoral votes to Washington, D. C., and cast them for President Coolidge. It was learned here today when the winning electors assured her of their support. Mrs. Cosgrove was nominated for elector at the Washington state convention by Governor
