

Sickness Which Got Many Victims Among Mexican Sections Halted

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7 .- Hopes of health authorities to curb the epidemic of pneumonic plague in the Mexican colony here were sustained tonight when only two new deaths had been reported in the past 24 hours, Dr. Walter M. Dickie, secretary of the state board of health and director of the anti-plague committee, announced. The total death list is

now 30. Further favorable indications were that no new cases of the disease have been reported since yesterday. The total number of cases since the flareup October 19 is 36. The physicians and nurses on inspection tours twice daily through the stricken area are constantly on the alert for suspects. while a vigorous rat killing campaign is under way and aimed at the extermination of the rodents.
