

STRONG UNDERTONE SHOWN BY STOCKS

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Stock prices displayed a strong undertone in today's market despite a large volume of profit taking sales and a marked falling off in business, the day's sales dropping be-

low the 2,000,000 share mark for the first time in any full session since a week ago Thursday. The general industrial average was lifted to a new high since 1920. The general railroad average showed advance. Speculative interest which has been shifting from one industrial group to another within the last few days reverted to the rails just before the close, New York Central crossing 117 to its highest price since 1912. FREER MOVEMENT IS BEING NOTED

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Dun's tomorrow will say "The confidence imparted to business continues to be reflected in the freer movement that is noticeable in the leading markets, and this has found expression in active buying, which has lifted prices of many basic products, among them wheat, cotton and hides and leather, to a substantially higher level. Evidence on all sides indicates that the markets have begun a readjustment to a state of freedom and security that had previously been jeopardized. Stocks continue to rise, and large funds which have been withheld are again seeking investment. The weather, which has militated somewhat against a normal movement of seasonal commodities, has enabled farmers, es-
