The proceeds of the concert will be used by the association for the fitting of a teachers' rest room in the Emerson building. The P. T. Miss Agnew, soprano, showed remarkable range in her program given Monday night. The Italian finish, gained by her study under Paul Petri, was very apparent. She perhaps showed her highest ability in "The Shadow Dance" from "Dinorah" by Meyerbeer, although there were those among the audience who expressed themselves as most enjoying "Rit" by Curran and "The Night Wind" by Farley. Mary Bullock, pianist, although handicapped by the non-arrival of the piano which had been ordered for the occasion, and forced to play on an inferior one, showed remarkable skill and was forced to respond to encores a number of times.
