Soviet Officials Break Social Dress Preceden

MOSCOW, Nov. 11 (AP) .-Official Moscow broke all social precedents since the Russian Revolution recently by coming out in full-dress evening clothes at an entertainment arranged by the Seviet government in aid of Russian village schools. It was the first time members of the foreign diplomatic corps participated with sentatives in a public function.

The ambassadors and ministers of all countries which have recog nized the Soviet were presen with their staffs. 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
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
