First School Case—The first rural case to come up under the provision made by the last legislature for the teaching of crippled children was reported to County School Superintendent Mary L. Fulkerson Tuesday. The law provided that for any child unable to attend classes on account of permanent illness the county shall set aside a fund equivalent to the per capita expense of tuition.
