In his discussion of foreign affairs, the president again took occasion to declare the United States. not to be disposed to join the league of nations; to appeal for support by public authorities and private citizens for the European reparations settlement plan, and to declare against cancellation by this country of the war debts.

Immediately upon the conclusion of the reading of the presidential message the last preliminary incident to the opening of the final session of the present congress, the senate and house started in on the real work that will occupy them for the next three months.

In the house, the first of the appropriation bills, that for the interior department, was taken up, while the senate gave brief consideration to the Muscle Shoals question, recessing until tomorrow with this legislation having the right of way.

President Coolidge's recommendations and the general legislative program were subjects of informal conferences among administration leaders at the capital and also were discussed at a meeting early in the day between the executive and some of the senators (lead-
