MILK GOAT REPORT FOR POLK COUNTY

Economic Conference Advocates Extension of the Industry in This Section

(The Statesman of yesterday contained the report of the flax committee of the Polk county agricultural economic conference, held at Dallas last month. The following is the report of the milk goats committee of that conference.)

Polk county has 63,180 acres of land which is adapted to the raising of milk goats. This is cut-over land, and land not adapted to agriculture.

The United States imports 80,

000,000 pounds of Roquefort cheese annually. It retails at 90 cents per pound.

Polk county has the only Roquefort cheese factory in the state.

There are 359 milk goats in Polk county, and 2500 in Oregon. Experience of growers of milk goats is that two acres will support a doe, and in addition one ton of hay will be required for every seven does.

Average return from Polk county milk goats annually is about \$25.

In view of the above, we recommend that milk goats be considered as a means of utilizing such lands as are not suitable for other agricultural needs as a source of profit to those who are sufficiently interested to give it the required attention.

STOCK QUOTATIONS GENERALLY LOWER

Wild Outburst Quelled by Sharp Reaction; Prices Are Now Irregular

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Another wild outburst of bullish enthusiasm sent more than 100 stocks to new high levels for the year in the early part of today's trading, but a deluge of selling orders by professional traders in the late afternoon brought about a sharp reaction from the top prices, leaving quotations irregularly lower.

Total sales, which exceeded 2,500,000 shares, were within 10,000 shares of the record established November 20, the highest in about eight years.

Railroad shares continued to lead the advance, contributing about one-third of the day's highs. Buying of these issues was given added stimulus by the publication of a statement showing that class 1 railroads reported net operating income of \$125,105,000 in October.
