

### COUNTY COMMUNITY CLUB CONGREGATES

Central Howell to Be Host for December Meeting; Soil Is Topic

The Central Howell community club is sponsoring the December meeting of the Marion County Community federation at the Central Howell church December 18, beginning at 8 o'clock.

Following a short program by the Central Howell community club a discussion will be held regarding a Marion county soil survey. The matter has already been taken up by the Salem Chamber of Commerce with W. L. Powers, chief of soils at OAC. The discussion Thursday night will disclose the attitude of the Central Howell district towards the survey.

Other counties of the Willamette valley have been surveyed by the soil department of the state experiment station of OAC in cooperation with the United States Bureau of soils.

William L. Teutsch, district agricultural agent of OAC, will deliver an address on "What I am Trying to Do For Marion County."

Additional speakers before the meeting will be F. B. Barnes of San Francisco, representing the United States Chamber of Commerce, who will talk on a "League of Neighbors."

A most interesting part of the program will be the two minute talks by those who won prizes at the Marion County Corn Show and Industrial Exhibit.

### INSTITUTIONS WILL DEMAND HUGE AMOUNT

700. The appropriation two years ago was \$490,000. Of this amount \$315,000 went to maintenance, \$16,900 for repairs and \$15,100 for permanent improvements, including several badly needed buildings and a heating plant. The estimated expenditures for the biennium were \$422,246.

300 Boys in School  
The 200 boys at the state training school will cost the state \$161,675, an average of \$21 a month for each inmate. Of the total amount operation will cost

\$81,430 and salaries \$67,380. Repairs and improvements will be \$12,875. Two years ago the appropriation was \$140,000, including \$119,740 for maintenance and \$20,260 for repairs and improvements. The estimated expenditures for the past biennium were \$136,592.

155 Are Tubercular  
General maintenance of the 155 average patients at the state tuberculosis hospital at \$45 a month each will amount to \$167,400, this amount taking into consideration \$79,320 for salaries and \$88,080 for operation. Repairs and improvements are estimated at \$17,901, giving a total recommended of \$195,301. The appropriation two years ago was \$118,150, divided \$149,050 for maintenance, \$6220 for repairs and \$32,880 for permanent improvements. The estimated expenditures for the biennium were \$185,333.

Few in Blind School  
The state school for blind generally maintains an average of 48 pupils at a cost of \$37.50 a month each, with \$47,200 sought from the legislature. Out of this amount \$25,530 is needed for salaries, \$17,670 for operation and \$4,000 for repairs and upkeep. Two years ago the appropriation was \$82,200, including maintenance of \$42,200, repairs, \$4,000, and a new building, \$36,000. The estimated expenditures for the biennium were \$80,654.

Girls Average 70  
Maintenance of the industrial school for girls is placed at \$67,840, based upon the average of 76 inmates at \$35 a month. Of this amount salaries will take \$24,000 and operation \$39,840. General repairs are estimated at \$4,000. The appropriation two years ago was \$55,608, and the estimated expenditures for the biennium were \$63,059. There was also appropriated and expended \$36,877 for a new building to replace one destroyed by fire.

Soldiers Cared For  
Care of the 112 veterans in the Old Soldiers' home at Roseburg at an average of \$34 a month each is placed at \$38,520, which includes \$27,815 for salaries, \$56,265 for operation and \$4800 for general repairs. Through the federal government the state receives \$10 per capita, leaving \$73,380 required by state appropriation. Two years ago the amount appropriated was \$100,871, including all expenses. The estimated expenditures for the past biennium were \$104,850.

135 Are Deaf  
Operation of the deaf school is estimated at \$119,959, based upon the average of 135 pupils at \$32

ington in addition to Willamette. New Conference Dies  
A rumor that action would be taken by a number of smaller schools to establish a new conference proved to be without foundation. A committee composed of Professor F. M. Erickson, of Willamette, chairman, Professor Davis, of Whitman, and Dean Condon, of the University of Washington was, however, delegated to work out a system of closer cooperation between Willamette university, Whitman college, Pacific university, and the College of Puget Sound, and this may possibly develop later into a separate group or sub-division of the northwest conference. This same committee was appointed last year to investigate the petition made by the College of Puget Sound for admission to membership in the northwest conference, and while a favorable report was made on the petitioning school this year, it was voted to hold action in abeyance until the new close cooperation plan develops. Another report will be presented next year.

Coach Rathbun last night expressed himself as very well pleased at the wonderful schedule arranged for Willamette in basketball and football. Idaho wanted a football contest with Willamette but the match could not be arranged due to a conflict in dates.
