

HEALTH FLAGS MAY BE PLACED BY LAW

Proposed City Ordinance Makes Placing Compulsory for Contagions

Physicians will be required to put up quarantine flags, if the ordinance now in preparation is accepted by the city council at its next meeting. Under the present ordinance a physician is not required to place a flag of quarantine when a contagious disease is discovered. All that is required is to report the case to the city health officer.

Because there is a lapse of 24 to 36 hours before the health officer receives the reports and additional time must elapse before the sign is displayed, there is an added danger of the spread of the disease.

This particular phase is not covered by the present city ordinance nor by the state law on the same matter. Legislation by the city council will suffice to correct the weakness that now exists.

The matter has been thoroughly considered by the ordinance committee and several conferences have been held with physicians in Salem.
