Many Pay Fines— During November a total of \$2,227.75 was paid in fines in the various courts of the state by traffic law violators, according to the monthly report of T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic officer. A total of 199 arrests were made by state officers. Accidents reported by state and county officers and the city of Portland totaled 2496. There were 264 persons injured and 11 killed during the month. The resale value of stolen automobiles recovered was estimated at \$4225. Licenses issued to foreign cars amounted to \$2026 and delinquent fees, operators' and chauffeurs' licenses, transfers and duplicate licenses added \$1192.02, making a total of \$10,265.77 received.

LADY BOLSHEVIST IS DISILLUSIONED

Isadore Duncan, Russian Dancer, is Sadder and Wiser After Russia

Pretty Isadora Duncan, the dancer with the classic figure and futurist intellect, is now playing the part of the prodigal daughter. Stranded in Berlin, after fleeing from the ugliness and filth of Communistic Russia, her jewels gone and no vaudeville contracts in sight, she renounces Bolshevism and asks the good God that she declared twelve short months ago in her emotional radical frenzy to be nonexistent to grant her wish to return to America.

During her last dancing tour in this country she waved the Red flag before her audiences and boasted of her Bolshevism. She left with a jeer on her lips and said she was going to Russia, where the people were not slaves to capitalism and where life was worth the living.

Sadder and wiser now, bruised and writhing like a crushed rose, she sobs for the protection of the society that she once abjured. Yet she is barred from this country by reason of her own utterances. She says she is not a Bolshevist, that Bolshevism is ugly and hateful, and she doubtlessly speaks truly.

Isadora Duncan is like thousands of others who have suffered from radicalism, which, in this country at least, is an emotional disease. While in the United States she was a stage favorite. She was feted and admired because of her physical charms. She became satiated with the very admiration she received, and craved excitement.

She lived lavishly under what she termed the capitalistic system. She denounced what she called the wage slaves who worked for others, while the box-office receipts were made up almost wholly of the contents of pay envelopes. Finally she married a Russian Red and departed for Russia, shaking from her dainty slippers the profane dust of the United States.

Now she is starving in Berlin. Her Red husband has left her. She says she tried to get a divorce in Russia; but the soviet law requires that both parties desiring a divorce shall appear before the divorce clerk. The office is open only in the mornings and her temperamental husband could never be persuaded to dress and go downtown until late in the afternoon.

When asked about the present whereabouts of Yessendin, her soul mate and poet of the soviets, she replied: "Oh, he has gone into the Caucasus to become a bandit. He writes that he is going to be a robber, to get thrills." Pretty Isadora is now barred from this country and from France, because of her radical utterances and her marriage to a Bolshevist. But she says she is a Bolshevist no longer and never was one at heart; it was a pose.

Her condition is somewhat similar to that of Emma Goldman in London. These two women have learned to their sorrow that when they were espousing Communism they were playing with fire. They are now prodigal daughters; but the immigration laws do not permit the American government to play the part of the father of the prodigal. Perhaps it is a mistake. It is possible that an amendment to the present laws may be devised that will permit some of these self-exiles who have paid the price of their folly to return.

While in this country they were credulous enough to accept Bol-
