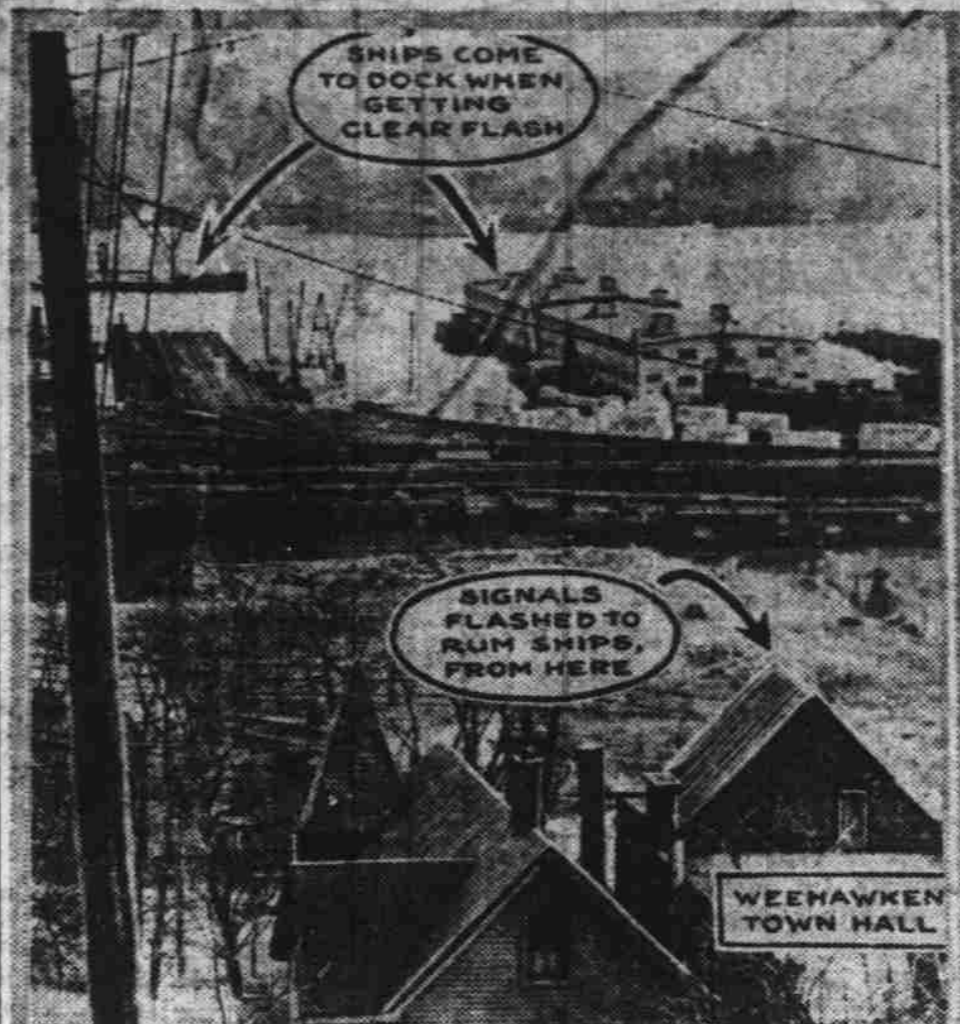
**Fire First Day—**
