 last year. The sales in that Mar-
 ket during this calendar year 1923
 amounted to 132,769 bales com-
 pared with 203,574 bales in
 1922.
 The number of animals
 slaughtered in freezing, salting
 and preserved meat works in Ar-
 gentina during the eight months
 January to August 31, 1924 were
 as follows, figures for same period
 of 1923 in parentheses; Cattle
 3,192,266 (2,285,484), sheep 3-
 093,054 (3,089,994), swine 79-
 921 (102,396). Cattle showed an
 increase of 40 per cent and swine
 a decrease of 22 per cent while
 sheep were about the same.
 Stock raising in Brazil was fair-
 ly successful during 1923 due to
 the resumption of activities on
 the part of several large packing
 houses in Soa Paulo and Rio de
 Sul. Frozen meat exports a-
 mounted to 146,818,000 pounds in
 1922 and 129,688,000 in 1921.

Berlin Aims Hard Blow
At City Wireless Fans
 BERLIN, Jan. 2.—Aviators
 flying over Berlin report that the
 numberless radio antennae over
 the houses of the city give it the
 appearance of a huge spider web.
 In the early morning hours the
 wires, stretching endlessly from
 roof to roof shine brightly with
 their coverings of frost.
 Seemingly harmless, and adding
 to the pleasure of radio fans,
 these wires have, however, created
 a serious problem. The chimney
 sweeps have protested that they
 interfere with their business, and
 in this they are supported by the
 men who repair roofs. Nor do
 the landlords like aerials and
 lead-ins.
 As a result of these various ob-
 jections, a city ordinance has been
 passed to the effect that all radio
 equipment over roofs within the
 city limits must come down, and
 no more may be erected.
 Hence it is seen that in Berlin
 radio is not as yet considered an
 advantageous instrument of social
 and commercial intercourse.

Stock Marketing Abroad
 Keen competition and high
 prices characterized the wool sales
 held at Christ Church, New Zealand,
 on Saturday, Nov. 29, ac-
 cording to cable received from
 Vice Consul Hudson of Wellington.
 Nearly all of the 11,000 bales
 offered were sold. The wool gener-
 ally was well grown and sound
 but a large portion was dusty,
 particularly that coming from the
 plains. While the bulk of the offer-
 ings were halfbred wool there
 was also a fair showing of plains
 crossbred. British buyers pur-
 chased practically two thirds, and
 the United States and local mills
 the most of the balance, only oc-
 casional lots going to continental
 buyers. Prices ranged as follows:
 Merino 52.1 to 73.3 cents—Half-
 bred, 54.0 to 81.1 cents—Corrie-
 dale 57.9 to 79.1 cents—Three-
 quarter bred, 42.5 to 65.6 cents
 Medium crossbred 42.5 to 57.9—
 Coarse crossbred 23.2 to 46.3
 cents and Crutchings 21.2 to 44.4
 cents per pound.
 According to the Yorkshire Ob-
 server of November 18, the Aus-
 tralian Wool Growers' Council and
 National Council of Wool Selling
 Brokers have decided to spread
 the wool selling season from Jan-
 uary to June for the realization of
 the balance of the 1924-1925 clip.
 A total of 1,150,000 bales will
 be disposed of as follows:
 January 200,000 bales, February
 225,000 March 250,000, April
 250,000, May 130,000 and the
 balance in June.
 The number of sheep in western
 Australia on December 31, 1923
 was 6,595,867 compared with 6-
 664,125 on December 31, 1922.
 This represents a decrease of 1
 per cent. All returns thus far
 received from New South Wales,
 Queensland, Victoria and Western
 Australia indicate fewer sheep at
 the beginning of the year 1924
 than at the same date of 1923. As
 both autumn and spring lambing
 this year have been successful
 returns for 1925 are likely to
 show an increase in sheep in Aus-
 tralia.
 Exports of wool from Australia
 during July, August and Septem-
 ber, the first three months of the
 1924-1925 season, totaled 232,000
 bales compared with 141,000 for
 the same period of 1923 or an in-
 crease of 64.5 per cent. Exports
 from New Zealand decreased from
 45,000 bales for July, August and
 September 1923 to 37,000 for the
 same three months of 1924.
 Sales of wool at the Central
 Produce Market in Buenos Aires
 from January 1 to September 30,
 1924 amounted to 59,483 bales of
 255 pounds compared with 82-
 500,000 FOR FIREWORKS
 LONDON, Jan. 2.—Guy Fawkes
 the man who attempted to blow
 up the House of Parliament, was
 heartily condemned when his plot
 was discovered, but he has since
 grown into something of a patron
 saint for English small boys and
 makers of fireworks. Estimates
 of the value of fireworks consumed
 in celebrating his special day,
 November 5, this year ran as
 high as \$5,000,000.

English Displaces Spanish
In Noted Filipino College
 MANILA, Jan. 2.—Santa Tomas
 University, the oldest college
 under the American flag, has de-
 cided upon the use of the English
 language in all classes, instead of
 Spanish, according to an an-
 nouncement by Father Manuel
 Arellano, rector of the institution.
 The change is to be made early in
 the coming year, when the univer-
 sity will move to larger quarters.
 The college of engineering is
 wholly under English instruction
 at present, and several other
 departments also are using Eng-
 lish.
 The university also has decided
 to admit women to all depart-
 ments. The college of pharmacy
 was thrown open to women last
 June, and the success of the de-
 parture has caused the trustees
 to reach the decision to admit wo-
 men to all departments, including
 law, medicine, engineering, phar-
 macy, philosophy and theology, as
 soon as the institution has become
 settled in its new buildings.
